

## ZEPPELIN'S CHIEF TALKS OF HIS TRIP

Breithaupt Says German Raiders Are Merely Fighting Enemies of Their Country.

### AIM AT ENEMY ARMED WORKS

LONDON, April 3.—"I do not think you would find an officer of the German navy or army who would willingly participate in the killing of women and children."

Lieutenant Commander Breithaupt, commander of the Zeppelin L-15, which was hit by shell fire in the raid Friday night on English towns and later sank in the Thames estuary, replied thus to the Associated Press correspondent when requested to explain the psychology of German air raids on defenseless cities and the killing of harmless civilians.

"I am very well satisfied with the treatment here," he said, "but naturally feel the loss of my freedom. As to air raids, we have a much more important object in view than the killing of women and children, namely, the destroying of the enemy's armed positions, warehouses and factories. Women and children become the victims of our operations, but not because we kill them intentionally. It is war."

**Wore Iron Cross.**

The commander declined to express himself as to whence the ship came, nor would he reply to questions regarding the length and duration of the raid, or whether he had participated in previous raids. But the iron cross with which he was decorated bore the date of the air raid of October, 1914, and he informed the interviewer that he had been in the Zeppelin service since the outbreak of hostilities.

Asked whether he knew the location of the ship during the raid in the darkness and whether he could distinguish buildings and other objects at night, he asserted that he could tell almost exactly but could not say whether the bombs fell where they were intended to fall, except in some instances.

**Fighting German's Enemies.**

Commander Breithaupt, who was a regular naval officer before the war, served in Australian wars and also in South America. He said he was acquainted with numbers of British naval men and did not feel any hatred for them, but was doing his duty in fighting the enemies of Germany.

Asked whether he participated gladly in air raids, he replied:

"Yes, I do my duty as an officer gladly. As to the risk in air fighting, we know the chances we run and are prepared to take them. Our aircraft was hit three times by shrapnel and we came down very rapidly into the water."

With respect to the altitude at which the raiding Zeppelins flew, he admitted that the height was very great, but evaded more definite particulars, merely smiling when 5,000 feet was mentioned, and saying:

"We should not reach England if we flew only at that height."

**Lieutenant's First Raid.**

Lieutenant Kusine, second in command, was more reticent, but said that it was his first raid on England. "I had hoped to come again," he added.

Lieutenant Kusine declared that he knew absolutely where the ship was when cruising and that the Germans were certain they had achieved considerable success in the raid. Both seemed convinced that their aircraft had done damage to the British fleet and military works.

All the members of the airship crew, when interrogated, expressed satisfaction at the treatment they had received. Their daily rations consist of a half

## March Not a Bad Month for Weather

According to the compilation of data by the local weather bureau, March was not so bad a month as March has the reputation of being. There were twelve clear days, eleven partly cloudy and eight designated as cloudy.

During March the highest temperature was 71 and the lowest 1 degree below zero. The mean temperature for the month was 40 degrees above, while the normal is 36. It was one of the dry months of March, the precipitation having been .35 of an inch. Twice since the weather bureau was established in Omaha in 1871, there has been a month of March when the precipitation was less. The normal for the month is 1.35 inches.

## German Stowaway Who Held Up Boat Would Stay in U. S.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Important arrests are expected within forty-eight hours, the police announced today, in connection with the case of Clarence Reginald Hudson, also known as Ernest Schiller, the German stowaway, who, single handed, captured the British steamer *Matoppe* and cowed her crew of fifty-six men.

When Hudson was assigned today on a charge of "suspicion of conspiring" to dynamite the Cunard line steamship *Pennonia*, the district attorney's office requested that his examination be deferred until tomorrow, explaining that

important developments were expected almost immediately.

To save himself from deportation to England and the possibility of being executed as a spy, Hudson has "confessed" to planning explosions on many munitions boats bound for ports of the enemy allies, the police say. He has repeatedly asked detectives to assure him that he would be held in the United States.

According to the story told by Hudson, his efforts to cause the destruction of steamers were financed by a young woman living in Salem, Mass., who is a German sympathizer. He asserts he went to Salem after escaping from a training camp for the British army in England, where he was employed in a textile mill at the outbreak of the war.

George Haller, 34 years old, a German, who admitted having met Hudson several times at hotels in Hoboken, was ar-

rested in that city tonight by detectives and a special agent of the department of justice, on a charge of being a disorderly person.

## NO MORE INFORMATION ABOUT SUBMARINES

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Official judgment still is suspended here on the case of the British channel steamer *Buzzard* and other merchant ships which, while carrying American citizens recently have met with disaster in the war zone. 
