RENEAU'S NAME GOES ON BALLOT

Attorney General Decides that Broken Bow Man is Entitled to Run.

GOOD LOSES IN DEATH RACE

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 3.—(Special Telegram.)—The name of J. A. Renuau of Broken Bow might have remained on the primary ballot as a candidate for the republican nomination as delegate-at-large to the national republican convention had he so willed.

The matter was put up to the attorney general and he has decided that as the petitions contained more than the required number of signers for the entire state that the name of Mr. Renuau could have a place on the ballot, leaving his opinion as to a former opinion of the supreme court in the Junkin case.

After securing this victory Mr. Renuau tonight decided that he had been vindicated and will ask the secretary of state to withhold his name from the ballot.

Losses in Race with Death.

Paul Good, Rhode scholar at Oxford, England, lost out today in his race with death to be at the bedside of his mother, Mrs. Judge B. F. Good of this city.

The young man was summoned home by cable two weeks ago, but was unable to secure passage at the time.

Pool a Financier.

Secretary of State Charles Pool is making a record as some financier, the report of his office for the month of March showing receipts far in excess of the same month for the two previous years.

The receipts for last month were \$2,421.19, all in cash, as Pool has for his motto, "To Trust is to Bust, Etc." The month of March, 1915, showed \$1,390.98 and for the same month of 1914, \$1,555.59. This includes the following items: Corporation permits, \$30; corporation penalties, \$5; filing articles of incorporation, \$2,075.10; notary commissions, \$123; brands, \$150; certificates and transcripts, \$95.50; labels and trademarks, \$6.95; sale of statutes, \$12; loan shark law, \$49; all other sources, \$14.48.

Automobile Plates.

In the automobile department, which is maintained by a 2-cent tax on each number issued, 9,159 automobile plates and 507 motorcycle plates were sent out during March. This makes a total number of automobile registrations of 64,146 up to March 31 and of motorcycle registrations of 2,154 for the first three months of this year. This considerably exceeds the total registrations for last year, the number for that year being 59,149 for automobiles. Mr. Pool figures that the total automobile registrations this year will not fall much below 90,000.

Expenditures of the department in connection with the issuing of licenses for the month of March were: Office supplies, \$16.08; extra help, \$247.50; salaries, \$387.32; postage, \$69; number plates, \$216.15, a total of \$1,067.00.

PAVING THE BIG ISSUE AT KEARNEY ELECTION

KEARNEY, Neb., April 3.—(Special Telegram.)—The city election at Kearney, which takes place tomorrow, has been one of the most hotly-contested campaigns in many years. Four members of the city council are to be elected, and with one exception the wards have from two to five contestants. The main issue involved is whether the city will continue the policy of the last year of paving and improving.

Several candidates have announced that they will demand paving petitions from residents before creating new districts instead of following the present law, which allows the council to create a district, giving the property owners an opportunity to protest against the move.

Several miles of street improvements have been put in under the system, while years of effort to get people to sign paving petitions have failed. The laboring men are almost solidly with the candidates who favor paving, while the reactionaries are found almost wholly among the other residents.

BANK SAFE REFUSES TO OPEN ON FOOLS' DAY

AURORA, Neb., April 3.—(Special.)—An April fool joke was sprung on the First National bank of this city Saturday when the doors of the vault refused to swing back. In spite of all of the coaxing and manipulation by President T. E. Williams and his assistants, the vault remained closed all day long and did not open up until 10 o'clock in the evening. The city was filled with farmers and scores of them had to do business with the First National. Fortunately another bank had enough and to spare so that business did not stop.

BEATRICE CAVALRYMAN IS ACCIDENTALLY KILLED

BEATRICE, Neb., April 3.—(Special Telegram.)—Mrs. Emma Gueffroy of this city today received a message stating that her son Adolph, a member of Company C, Twentieth Cavalry, U. S. A., had been accidentally shot and killed by a comrade while on patrol duty on the Mexican border near Hachita Sunday. The deceased was 22 years of age and worked for the Drummer mill for years before enlisting in the army. He was born at Newark, Neb. The body will be brought here for interment.

Thrown Through Windshield When Two Autos Collide

TECUMSEH, Neb., April 3.—(Special.)—Howard Brown of Crab Orchard and George Maharry, a traveling salesman from Lenox, Ia., were painfully, but not seriously, injured in an automobile collision at 10:30 o'clock Saturday night. The accident was on the road from Crab Orchard to Tecumseh near Vets. Brown was driving Maharry to Tecumseh to catch a midnight train. James Murphy was returning to his home near Vets. The Brown car and the Murphy car collided with terrific force. Maharry was thrown through the windshield by the impact from the collision and suffered lacerations of the leg, one arm and his face from broken glass. Brown was thrown out on his chest and suffered from the effects of the fall. Murphy was but slightly injured. It is not known what caused the accident. Both cars were carrying lights.

Notes from Sutherland.

SUTHERLAND, Neb., April 3.—(Special.)—The West Central Nebraska declaratory contest is to be held here next Saturday, April 8. The contest was to occur at North Platte this year, but an epidemic of a serious nature caused the change in location. Fifteen or more schools in the district will be represented.

The East St. Louis Bridge company, which has the contract for constructing the state aid bridge across the South Platte river immediately south of Sutherland, is making arrangements preliminary to actual operations.

A 14-month-old daughter of Harry Maron, residing southeast of town, was buried Thursday, death having resulted from the effects of injuries received in a runaway a day or two previously. The child and its mother were thrown from a wagon against a wire fence. The mother's injuries were serious.

TAKE NEW TACK IN EFFORT TO SOLVE O'CONNOR MYSTERY

HARTINGS, Neb., April 3.—(Special Telegram.)—R. A. Harris of Omaha started proceedings to exhume the body of John O'Connor for identification by the alleged son, John Kirkman of Omaha. In the latter's will for the \$100,000 O'Connor estate, Harris states that a peculiar bone formation has been discovered in the body of John Kirkman and other generations of his family. To prove that Kirkman and others inherited these bone formations from John O'Connor, it is desired that the body of the reclusé be exhumed for examination by X-ray.

Permit to exhume the body was signed by Mayor Madgett, but City Clerk Stratton on the advice of City Attorney Burdman withheld his signature without, which it is imperative. Mr. Burdman characterized the move as nothing more than a "fishing expedition for evidence to substantiate a theory of bone peculiarities." He asserted that the Omaha people had nothing tangible upon which to make good their claims that such an extraordinary move should be allowed. The county judge also refused to act.

AURORA, Neb., April 3.—(Special.)—Speaking to a large audience at the men's meeting of the Young Men's Christian association Sunday afternoon, Judge Jacob Fawcett of the Nebraska supreme court, declared that the future of the American republic rests in the integrity, courage and good common sense of the common people of the country. Judge Fawcett's address was of a patriotic nature and met with a hearty reception from the men of Aurora.

Registration at Beatrice is Heavy

BEATRICE, Neb., April 3.—(Special.)—Prospects are that a big vote will be polled at the city election next Tuesday, as 2,225 voters had registered when the registration board closed its books at the city hall Saturday evening. Six candidates, three for the commissioner plan and three for the manager plan, are in the race, and three are to be elected. The city has been under the commissioner system the last few years, and at the election Tuesday the voters will be given an opportunity to vote for the proposed new system. The candidates for the commissioner system are J. H. C. Field, J. P. Saunders and G. T. Reynolds, and for the manager plan H. A. Thompson, E. I. Heilone and Conrad Stroh. Another issue to be fought out with the ballots is for and against the saloons. Beatrice is at present "wet" and the high license workers believe they will retain the saloons, while the opposition is equally confident that they will lose out. For members of the school board the candidates for the short term are J. W. Burgess, C. A. Spelman, Vernon D. Andrews, Dr. C. W. Walden and O. L. Beeson, and for the long term, J. A. Barnard, Mrs. Laura Peck Fishback and A. O. Burkatt.

DENTAL EXAMINERS ARE UPHELD BY COURT

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., April 3.—(Special.)—Frank Arnold Patterson of Gordon began the practice of dentistry in Nebraska without troubling to procure a license to practice. The state board of dental examiners were taking steps to prosecute him under the dental law, when Patterson applied to Judge Westover for an injunction, which was granted in August, 1915.

The case came on for hearing March 30 and upon the argument of Deputy Attorney General Dexter T. Barrett, Judge Westover dismissed the case and dissolved the injunction.

Mr. Barrett contended that Patterson had failed to state a cause of action in his petition; that the several allegations of his petition were improperly joined, and that Patterson had an adequate remedy at law. All of these contentions were sustained by Judge Westover.
