COFFEY COMMENTS ON DAMAGE CASES

Points to Benefits that Accrue to Injured Employes by Reason of Compensation Law.

TWO INSTANCES ARE CITED

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 5 .- (Special.) -- State considerable to say in a comparison of two cases for damages, one before the liability law was passed and the other since that time. Both were Omahin cases.

"The just and equitable and human provisions of the compensation law were never more strikingly set forth than in the opinion written by Judge Letton in the case in the supreme court of Mary J. Moriarity, a scrub woman, against the Millard hotel in Omaha," said Commissioner of Labor Coffey in discussing the decision of the suprems court reversing the judgment for the scrub woman secured in the Douglas county district

The accident austained by Mary Morfarity occurred before the compensation law became effective, and, of course, the compensation law did not apply. Pollowing the common law and statute rule the court held that the scrub woman assumed the hazard of the employment.

Gond to Colorado for Trial. 'Whether we agree with the court that this woman should be held to have as sumed the hazard of the employment when this hazard admittedly was the performance of an illegal act by the de fendant, or, in other words, that this scrub woman could have been held to have assumed the hazard resulting from fllegal acts by her employer, or that she could have been held to have assumed that the employer would do an illegal act in connection with her employment, is not material in comparing the old method with the application of the principles of the compensation law.

Victor J. McConigal was employed by the Omaha Gas company as a salesman A part of his duty was to call upon cus tomers in different parts of the city, un der direction of his employer. He was directed to use the street cars in the furtherance of his employment as a sales-

"In stepping off a moving street car McGenigal felt on the pavement as a reeldent occurred since the adoption of the instruction is 400, compensation law. He was injured in the course of his employment, though there could be no fault traced to his em ployer. He was compensated for the injury under the compensation law.

"If Mary Moriarity had sustained her injury subsequent to the adoption of the compensation law, she could and would have received something more substantial at the hands of the supreme court than an expression of sympathy."


