FILM FIRM BUYS TOWN OF RALSTON

Movie Company Will Build Second Universal City for Manufacture of Moving Pictures.

HALF MILLION IS CONSIDERATION

One of the biggest real estate deals in the history of Omaha was consummated here during the last week, according to apparently reliable information. The deal calls for the purchase of all but a very small portion of the entire city of Ralston, Neb., a place of nearly 300 population. It is to be renamed and rebuilt into a model moving picture city, where films will be taken and manufactured. It is declared that the consideration named in the transfer is over half a million dollars, and that the purchasers will expend an additional million in making the thriving little Nebraska village even greater than the famous "Universal City" of California.

Deal Shrouded in Secrecy.

The deal was made through the Ralston Townsite company, of which C. C. Shimer, Omaha capitalist, is president. The Ralston Townsite company owned most of the city property in Ralston, and it is declared that they have transferred their entire holdings. Mr. Shimer, however, would not verify the report. News of the deal leaked out in Ralston where a large corps of engineers and surveyors commenced operations. It was learned then that the Ralston Realty company, 622 Brandeis theater, had made the purchase. The Ralston Realty company is headed by H. E. Schaeffer and is affiliated with the Rialto Amusement company of Nebraska, the latter being the same concern which started the city commissioners last week by offering to spend \$500,000 on the municipal Auditorium to make it into a palatial movie theater and provide simple accommodations at the same time for conventions, etc.

Neither Affirm Nor Deny.

Mr. Schaeffer, like Mr. Shimer, would neither affirm nor deny the report, but displayed considerable agitation over it. In investigating the report it was hinted that men who helped promote and organize Universal City have a hand in his transformation reported scheduled for Ralston. It is their plan, it is declared, to develop in Ralston the largest film manufacturing industry in the world. But little is known of the plans of the new owners of most of the city of Ralston. Those connected with the concern refuse to talk, but hinted that something unusual might develop soon. H. E. Schaeffer, the president of the Rialto Amusement company, is associated with several wealthy Omahans who were back of the Auditorium project, and it is supposed that they are with him in this, too.

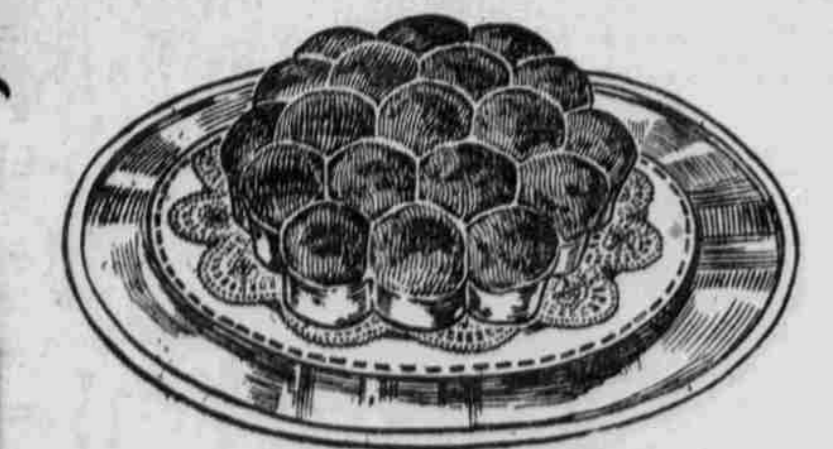
