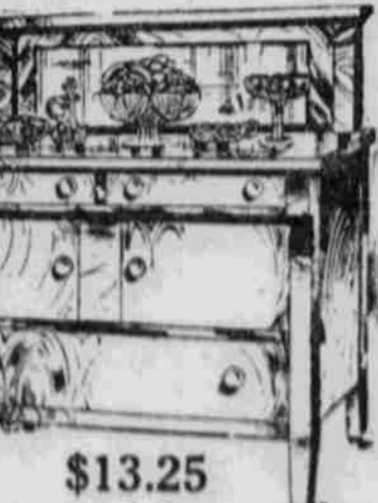

"CABIN MOTHER" IS STILL FAR IN LEAD

Crowds Continue to Flock to Fine Arts Exhibit and Vote Their Preferences. PRAISE FOR OMAHA ARTISTS

The large crowds visiting the exhibit of northwestern artists, which is being held at the public library under the auspices of the Omaha Fine Arts society, continue to show a preference for Ada Walter Shultz' "The Cabin Mother," the painting that is leading in the voting in the popularity contest.

"Pennies," from the brush of Gertrude J. Barnes, although having received scores of votes Wednesday, remains in third place.

Many Omaha art lovers were enthusiastic over two paintings in the exhibit from the brush of Hans Stoltenberg of Wauson, Wis. "Autumn," a work that attracts much attention because of its rich, delicately blended colors and effect of tone, has received many votes in the last few days.

"Milwaukee River," Mr. Stoltenberg's other painting, "Milwaukee River," has also been the subject of much favorable comment.

One of the paintings that has shown wonderful gains in the popularity contest is "Near Turkey Mountain," the work of an Omaha artist—George Barker, Jr. A large number of votes were cast for this canvas Wednesday evening.

Robert Koehler, represented at the local exhibit with two finely executed paintings in oil, "At Gloucester, Mass.," and "Portrait of H. Gaura," was born in Germany, but was brought to this country when he was only 3 years old.

Edwin H. Dawes, represented in the Omaha exhibit with "New York Harbor" and "Woodland Hillside," is truly an artist of the northwest. He was born in Iowa. As an artist, Mr. Dawes was entirely self-taught. He has been winning awards each year since 1899 at the different exhibits held in northwestern states.

Prairie for Minneapolis Man

Edwin H. Dawes, who painted "Violenta," a well-kept-up canvas in the local exhibit, is also a Minneapolis man. He is president of the Minnesota State Art commission and a director of the Minneapolis School of Fine Arts.
