

Nebraska**COUNTIES MUST PAY FOR CARE OF INSANE**

Referee Broady Files Report in Action Brought in State Supreme Court.

STANTON AND GAGE INVOLVED

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

LINCOLN, April 7.—(Special Telegram)—When W. H. Howard of Omaha was state auditor he began a campaign for the collection of fees due the state from several counties for expenses of insane patients to the state asylum. In some instances these amounts ran up into thousands of dollars for each county, the whole aggregating about \$60,000.

He was unsuccessful in getting settlements from most of the counties, but some of them resisted collection of the amounts and went to suit to prevent collection. The matter was taken to the supreme court and J. H. Broady of Lincoln was appointed a referee to look up the matter and report to the court. This he has done and today filed his report showing that Stanton county, the one on which the test was made, was liable to the state for the full amount due, a part of which had been paid, leaving a balance of \$2,345.

Gage County, Also.

Gage county, which was also contesting the election, while the case was some different, will also have to pay, the contention of the county that the statute of limitation had run not being allowed by the referee.

The present auditor, W. H. Smith, has continued to collect from other counties which had made agreements to pay and most of them have made remittances from time to time.

Estatees to the State.

The state was made richer today by the receipt of a check for \$65,56 by the result of the efforts of Attorney General Willis Reed in fighting for property which he considered had escheated to the state by reason of the fact that there were no claimants who appeared to have a right to it.

The property was of a personal character and was left by Karl March of Omaha and after a suit in court, in which Mr. Reed appeared for the state, the court decided in favor of the state, and the check was received by the state treasurer this morning.

There is another Omaha estate for which Mr. Reed is making a fight which involves about \$35,000, formerly the property of James Bates, in which an effort is being made to secure it by alleged relatives and which the attorney general believes they have no right to. He will appear in the courts there shortly and endeavor to secure the property for the state.

Nebraska**STRICT RULE FOR HAIL MEN**

Complete Change in Officers of Nebraska Company Must Be Made.

LICENSE HANGS IN BALANCE

LINCOLN, April 7.—(Special Telegram)—A complete change in the offices of the Nebraska Hall Insurance company of Hastings will have to be made before the state insurance board will issue a license to them to do business in this state. This in effect is the resolution passed by the state board and issued by Insurance Commissioner Eastham.

Much complaint has come to the insurance commissioner during the last year regarding failures of the company to settle insurance losses, it being shown by the department that only about 10 per cent of the hail losses were paid in 1915.

A new rule adopted by the insurance board limits the amount of salaries to be paid to officers according to the amount of business done by the company. A president cannot, however, receive more than \$2,000 per year, unless he also acts as manager of the company, when he can draw not over \$2,000.

Another rule requires the companies to include in the premium assessments collected from members whatever amount may be needed to pay the commissions of agents, not exceeding a certain percentage of the policy in each instance. In the last commissioners have been paid out of other funds.

The insurance board also adopted a rule which will allow fraternal insurance associations and mutual companies to invest their funds in irrigation bonds, subject to the approval of the board.

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
