HUGHES LOGICAL MAN FOR POSITION

Captain Allen G. Fisher of Chadron Says He Finds Voters of One Mind.

STRAWS SHOW THE CURRENT

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 7.—(Special)—Hughes sentiment in north Nebraska is exceedingly strong, according to Captain Allen G. Fisher of Chadron, who attended a session of the supreme court today. In the opinion of Captain Fisher all it is necessary to do is to impress upon the minds of the republican voters of the state that they should write in the name of Charles E. Hughes on the preference ballot and the judge will receive sufficient votes to give him the delegation from this state.

"He is the logical candidate," said the Chadron attorney, "and if he heads the republican ticket in the general election, democrats might just as well throw up the sponge and take their medicine like little men and make up their minds that the county will be run right in the years to come."

A man who was interested in the matter of writing in the name of Hughes on the ballot took a little time this morning and distributed slips which have been prepared showing how to write in the name of Hughes. He says that he found only one man who had doubts on the subject. "However," he said, "if I thought the voters would take hold of the matter I would not only write the name in, but would work along that line to help the cause along."
