It is those that can, perhaps, popularly be called "fashion," although they are really charming when done just right.

Ones that are not "fashion" are those which are used with evening dresses for dancing. They are modest, and they are useful. A woman has much more freedom in them than she has when she has to think all the time about the swishing of her skirt.

Parasols are going to be gayer, more fantas-
