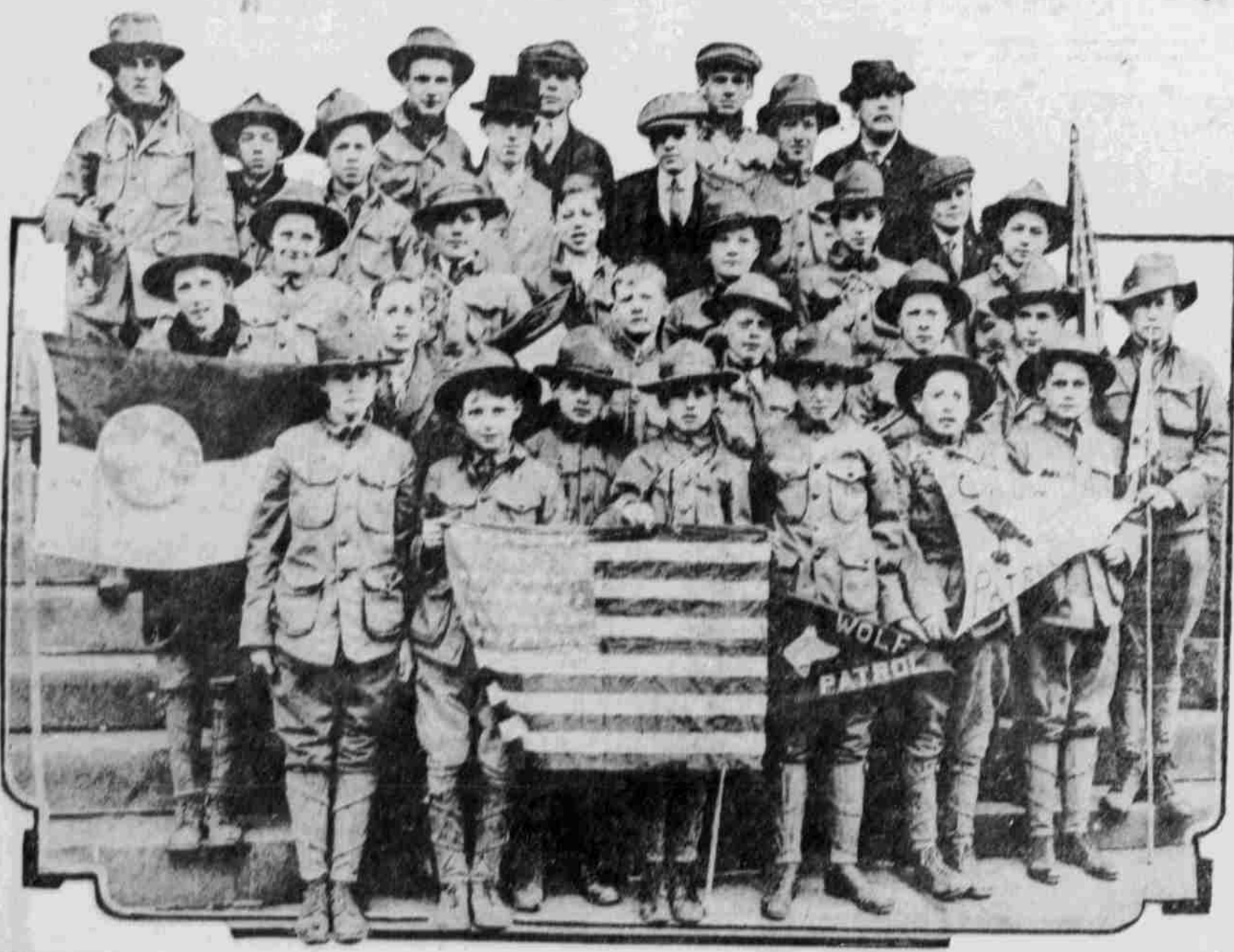


Troop of Omaha Boy Scouts of America, Who Demonstrate Some of Their Work to School Boys



GERMAN LEADERS DISCUSS ADDRESS

Centrists and Socialists in Reichstag Go Over Chancellor's Address on War Conditions.

THINK U. S. FAVORS ENTENTE

BERLIN, April 8.—(Via London.)—Following the speech of historical importance made in the Reichstag yesterday by Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, Dr. Peter Spahn, leader of the socialists, took up the speaker's words and endeavored to expand upon the chancellor's declarations concerning Belgium and the relations between Germany and the United States.

Dr. Spahn endeavored to expand the chancellor's words into a declaration that Belgium, whatever its formal status after the war may be, "must remain politically, militarily and economically" in German hands.

For this interpretation, however, the chancellor's words furnish no basis. Americans Favor Entente. Taking up the American question, Dr. Spahn said: "The press, people and the government of America have shown by their conduct that their sympathies and business instincts favor England and not Germany."

Dr. Spahn referred to the prolonged negotiations with the United States in regard to the submarine question, saying in that connection: "Americans of German descent have indeed endeavored to create a sentiment for our view, unfortunately without success. It is incomprehensible, in view of the sound business instinct of Americans, that the interests concerned in legitimate export trade continually how to British encroachments on maritime rights."

Here Spahn said he welcomed the declaration by the chancellor of a more definite peace program, but declared he had no expectations of any response from the governments at London, Paris and Petrograd, although it was evident the inclination for peace was increasing among the peoples.

WILSON AWAITING WORD FROM KAISER

United States Will Not Take Any Action in Case Until Gerard Reports.

DISCUSSED AT CABINET MEET

WASHINGTON, April 8.—President Wilson and his cabinet discussed at length today the recent attacks on merchant vessels carrying Americans and agreed to defer any decisive steps while awaiting the German government's reply to the inquiry of Ambassador Gerard whether German submarines sank the Sussex, Englishman, Manchester Engineer and Eagle Point.

The president and Secretary Lansing expect the desired information from Berlin to arrive at any time. A preliminary report from Mr. Gerard, said in unofficial dispatches to have been forwarded from Berlin, had not arrived here late tonight.

MRS. FELICIE MODJESKA ASKS FOR MORE MONEY

Some interest is being manifested in Omaha over the suit of Ralph Modjeska, bridge expert, who was formerly connected with the engineering department of the Union Pacific in Omaha, by Mrs. Felicie Modjeska for a higher separation allowance. HUNTS DOWN VILLA; COUSIN WRONGED

Mexican Youth, Whose Girl Relative Was Mistreated by Bandit Leader, Guides Americans.

OUTLAWS CARRY OFF WOMEN

DOUGLAS, Ariz., April 8.—An account of Francisco Villa's attack upon San Buenaventura and the adjacent town of El Valle on March 14 was given here today by Mrs. George Reed, wife of an American mining man, and for twenty years a resident of that section of Chihuahua. Her eldest son, who afterward accompanied Colonel George A. Dodd's force on its famous dash to Guerrero, escaped Villa by fleeing, scantily clad, to adjacent mountains, where he hid for three days without food until informed by friends that Carranza troops had driven off the bandits.

First a squad of Villa soldiers and later Villa himself came into the Reed home, looting and wrecking it. Villa cursed Mrs. Reed, she says, charging that her husband and son had a large store of food, arms and ammunition hidden in the house. This she denied. Then as Villa insisted, she invited him to search the premises.

Several soldiers were set to work with picks and crowbars digging in the garden and tearing up floors. Finding nothing, Villa sent several of his men after baroness and superintended the operation

of spreading this through the house when the Carranza soldiers arrived and the Villa's fled.

Spread Oil Through House.

In San Buenaventura and El Valle, Villa's men looted, and attacked women and little girls, carrying away thirty-seven boys and five girls as captives.

George Reed, Jr., who has also returned to the border after his trip with Colonel Dodd's men, declared that one of the most valued guides with the expedition in Jesus Andino, a Mexican captured at El Valle by Villa, who later escaped and joined the American soldiers, Reed said, now sworn vengeance against the bandit, charging that he mistreated his cousin, Manuela Para, one of the girl captives. The youth said that the boy prisoners were told they must fight for Villa, but he managed to elude the guards and escaped on a black charger.

Andino is said to be thoroughly familiar with the country as far south as Parral, and relentless in his determination to pursue Villa until he is captured or killed.

In the first clash with American troops, Reed said, Villa, with but eight men, fled at the first sign of trouble, leaving his main force to their own resources. He declared positively that Villa is not wounded.

SOLDIERS WRITE HOME ON HARD TACK BOXES

COLUMBUS, N. M., April 8.—Cardboard sides of "Hardtack" canteens are being used by advanced detachments of American troops in Mexico for letter writing purposes. Three boxes of mail, all written on bits of box, arrived at the army base here today. Some of the soldiers contented themselves with fashioning postcards, while others extemporized envelopes by folding a second bit of the cardboard over the communication. This was taken by officers here to substantiate reports that the troops are close on the trail of Villa, making all possible speed, not even waiting for supplies.
