Cash Wheat is Quite Active and Jumps One to Two Cents Up on a Good Demand.

CORN FIRM AT UNCHANGED

OMAHA, April 10, 1916. Cash wheat was quite active today, ranging from a low to a high of 1.19 1/2. Receipts were heavy, but the traders had no difficulty in disposing of their supplies.

There was a fair demand for corn and both of these markets remained unchanged. Clearance was slow and the market was quiet.

Receipts of 15,000 bushels of wheat and 5,000 bushels of corn were reported today. The market for both was quiet.
