St. Paul Resident Anxious to Ascertain Whether Bite of Animal Was Dangerous.

SCHOOL MEN ARE EVER ACTIVE

LINCOLN, April 10.—(Special Telegram.)—Assistant State Veterinarian McKel, in today received the brain of a horse formerly owned by Dr. Killers' in Paul, which had bitten Mrs. Killers and her two children.

A short time ago a steve which had been bitten by a mad dog of the neighborhood after hitting a man and his boy was killed. The two victims were sent to Kansas City for treatment and have returned, but as it takes from three to five years for the disease to develop it is not known how successful the treatment may have been. Mrs. Killers is now on her way to Chicago for a specialist in rabies, and the brain of the horse was forwarded to the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor for diagnosis.

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Negro Youth Arrested Charged with Breaking and Entering, and Faces Trial.

Howard Chin, negro youth, who has caused juvenile authorities and local police a great deal of trouble in the last year or so, is again under arrest at the local station charged with breaking and entering. Chin, it is said, was caught yesterday morning removing a bar from a window of the Loyal Shoe store at 315 N. street by Emil Miller, South Side, who happened to be passing through the alley at that time.

Miller called the station and Captain Vanous dispatched Detectives Gillen and Allen on the case. Miller was there and described Chin so accurately that the officers immediately made their way to the latter's home at 226 N. street and made the arrest. He will be prosecuted in criminal court regardless of his being under age.

Chin was arrested some time ago on a charge of stealing parcel post packages from the mail box of a west side home. He was reprimanded and told that on the next offense he would be sent to the state reform school. Juvenile Officer Paul McAuley will have charge of the case.
