Hammer Out Seventeen Hits and Romp Home with 11 to 5 Victory Over Sioux City.

KRUEGER HITS THOUSAND

FAIRBURY, Neb., April 10.—(Special Telegram.)—In a swiftest here this afternoon between Pa. Rourke's hopefuls and Gaspar's Sioux, the former team reversed the defeat of yesterday by taking the game, 11 to 5.

Ideal weather prevailed for peppy base ball, in fact, it was the finest day since the Sioux commenced training at this point.

PAYNTER GOES OUT FOR TRACK SQUAD

Central High Hopes Advance with Return of Crack Distance Man to Cinder Path Crew.

MAY ENTER SIOUX FALLS MEET

The first call for track men was made by Coach Mulligan yesterday and a big meeting of all boys interested in track work will be held after school today.

Coach Mulligan will probably enter a team in the contemplated Sioux Falls meet if the date set does not interfere with the state and Missouri valley meets.

Floyd Paynter has turned out for track, having recovered from his recent heart trouble. Paynter has given up the mile run and will spend all his time on the half mile. He made good time in the half mile last year in the state and Missouri valley meets. Last year was his first year at the distance runs and the coach expects that with his former experience to rely upon he may set up another state record at this distance.

Raymond Burgess will be the only mile runner that the school will have this year, since Paynter has forsaken this run. Wilber Pullaway and James Reynolds are counted upon to uphold the school's record in the hurdles. Much time has been spent by the coach in an effort to develop a few weight men. Jesse Patty, John Crowley, Floyd Paynter and Wilber Pullaway seem the best prospects.

Gasoline Higher in Some Sections of the Country

WASHINGTON, April 10.—The federal trade commission today presented to congress a preliminary report on its investigation of the raise in the price of gasoline. The report carries a mass of statistics on production and prices, but draws no conclusions as to the increase of the latter.

Of alleged price discriminations, which the commission is charged with investigating under a senate resolution, the report says: "If prices are found to have been raised to higher levels in some sections than in others, making due allowance for quality of product, freight and marketing conditions, it may be inferred that an element of artificial manipulation has entered into the advance."

Gasoline Content Decrease

Content of all the oil produced in the United States decreased during the year. The estimate of the year's total gasoline content for all the oil in the country was 1,392,000,000 gallons.

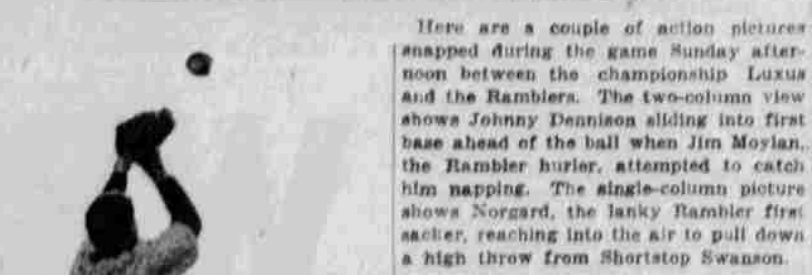
Standard Prices Lower

Price ranges show that the price charged by the independents averages about 1 cent higher than Standard Oil prices. The Standard was selling gasoline, 7.6 c. at its refineries, at 1.93 cents a gallon January 1, 1915, and the independents were charging 3.28 for the same grade. There was little change until August, when the Standard price went to 1.38 and the independent price dropped to 3.00 cents. Four months later, in December, the Standard was charging 12.54 and the independents 13.01 cents.

Talk of New Base

Much speculation was expressed among officers here today as to the possibility of the establishment of a new expeditionary base at a point east along the border and nearer the actual field of operations than Columbus. It is stated that as the length of the line of communication now approximately 600 miles long, increases, the problem of keeping it open becomes proportionately more difficult.
