WESTERN MEN TO WRITE HUGHES IN

J. W. Mann of Wauneta Says Chase County Voters Are Extremely Favorable.

LINCOLN, April 12.—(Special.)—Sentiment is strong in western Nebraska favorable to the nomination of Charles E. Hughes for the republican candidate for the presidency.

A very strong following will go to the trouble to write in the name of the distinguished jurist in the blank line left for that purpose on the preferential ballot, according to reports coming to Lincoln.

This was especially emphasized today by J. W. Mann of Wauneta, a leading republican of Chase county, who visited the state house and called at the office of the state superintendent.

Mr. Mann said that if Mr. Hughes' name could be printed on the ballot he believed the western part of the state, or at least that section in which he resides, would be very strong for him and the result of the primary would so show.

However, as it is, he believes there will be a general writing in of the name of Hughes and that he will get a big vote out there.

Falls City Women Denounce Campaign Methods of Wets

FALLS CITY, April 12.—(Special.)—The women of Falls City and vicinity met in mass at the Christian church on Tuesday afternoon about 80 strong and expressed their indignation at having the saloons thrust upon the town by outside influences.

Many women from the surrounding country and neighboring towns were present and expressed their indignation at Falls city allow such proceedings and said they did not care to trade in a town where there were saloons and would go elsewhere to trade should Falls city take such saloons.

The meeting was advertised to take place in the court house, which proved entirely too small for the crowd. The women then adjourned to the church, marching on a mass down the main street and creating a sensation as the merchants thought the meeting was to boycott those who voted "wet."

At the close of the meeting the women marched up the street singing, "Dry Clean Nebraska Where You Are." They were served sandwiches and coffee in an empty building opposite the court house.

Resolutions were adopted denouncing alleged illegal voting at the recent election here and censuring Governor Morehead, Warden Fenton, State Engineer Johnson, Member of State Board of Control Gerdes and former Congressman McGuire for their activity in behalf of the wet forces.

NOTES FROM BEATRICE AND GAGE COUNTY

BEATRICE, Neb., April 12.—(Special.)—Announcement was received here yesterday of the death of Oscar Pilley, formerly of this city, which occurred Monday night at his home at Tulsa, Okl., of cancer of the stomach.

The deceased was the son of Hon. Elijah Pilley, after whom the town of Pilley was named, and was 46 years of age. He was employed in the district clerk's office here for years before going to Oklahoma. He is survived by a widow and two children. The body will be brought to Beatrice for interment.

The village board of Pickrel has cut the saloon tax to \$200 after having met last week and increased it to \$200. The combination chemical, hose and ladder truck, which the city commissioners purchased last winter at a cost of \$5,000, arrived in the city yesterday. The machine has a sixty-horse power engine and is guaranteed to run sixty miles an hour.

The city commissioners held a special meeting yesterday morning and passed an ordinance increasing the salaries of the three officials from \$1,000 to \$1,200 per year, and adding \$500 to the salary of the mayor, making his yearly stipend \$1,500 per year.

CANCELS LIFE INSURANCE AND DIES WITHIN MONTH

GARRISON, Neb., April 12.—(Special.)—Because he thought that life insurance was wrong, Walter D. Kernes, for the last eight years section foreman on the Burlington here, turned in all his policies and ceased his payments about four weeks ago. Last week Kernes was taken suddenly insane and taken to the state hospital at Hastings. Tuesday evening his body was brought back to Garrison for burial. He leaves a wife and three small children.
