REGENTS HAVE LEeway IN DECIDING ON CONTRACT

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 14.—(Special.)—Regents of the University of Nebraska must decide the best thing to be done in considering bids for construction of buildings under the special levy made, according to Attorney General Reed in an opinion given Regent Hall, as follows:

In response to your oral inquiry, whether the Board of Regents of the State university, under the constitution and existing laws, are warranted, at this time, in entering into a contract, or contracts, for the extension or construction of any building or buildings upon the grounds of the State university, within the limits of the special levy, the legislature must necessarily have been aware of the fact that buildings of this kind and character, which you are required to cause to be constructed, cannot be completed instantly; in fact, it must necessarily reach over a long period of time.

The making of the levy, from which you are required to use, does not show any intention that it will be collected in full, and yet you are authorized, empowered and required to accomplish the construction of which levy, that is, for the construction of buildings, was necessarily made, and the appropriations certainly constituted some uncertainty in dollars and cents of the amount which will ultimately reach the treasury, and the payment on the contract made.

With reference to accepting a bid which has recently been made, if, in your judgment it is the best which can be obtained, you should accept it, you might be derelict in your duty if you delay further.

APPEALS TO HIGH COURT FROM JUDGMENT IN HALL

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 14.—(Special.)—Joseph F. Wilson of Hall county has appealed to the supreme court from a judgment secured in the district court of that county in favor of Michael Sullivan for \$2,000.

Sullivan was shot by Wilson while at work in his field last year cultivating corn. According to the evidence, Wilson and another man were riding along the road next to the Sullivan cornfield and just before reaching the place where the latter was at work Wilson drew a revolver and shot at a rabbit which ran along the side of the road. Missing the first shot he fired again and the bullet hit Sullivan, entering his body near the hip and passing through, lodging in the other hip.

Sullivan claimed to be able to earn \$1,500 as a farmer each year and sued for \$10,133.00.

Young Man Found Shot.

HAVENNA, Neb., April 14.—(Special.)—Irvin Hofffeld, a young man about 23 years of age, was found dead at the home of his parents early this morning, the surroundings pointing to suicide by shooting. No reason can be given for the act, and no word was left by him. The Hofffeld family live about five miles northwest of Havenna in the edge of Sherman county, and the father, Gust Hofffeld, is a prominent and well-to-do German farmer.

Miss Lena Frances Townsend died at the sanatorium in Hastings last Monday evening, aged 14 years, after an operation for cancer and subclavicular tumor. The body was brought home Tuesday and services were held in the Methodist church Wednesday afternoon. Miss Townsend was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. N. Townsend of Edgar. The body of Mrs. Mattie Osborne, who died at her home in Ayre at midnight Sunday, was brought to Edgar for burial Wednesday. Rev. A. L. Ogden of Bethany officiated at the services in the Christian church at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon.
