

#### This Is The Man

The subject of this sketch was born on a farm in Clay County, near Fairfield, in Nebraska, April 15, 1881. He remained upon the farm until of age, and then en tered upon farm paper work. His first experience was as field man. For three years his work took him into all parts of the state. He then became editor, and later principal owner of The Nebraska Farmer, the oldest farm paper weat of the Missouri river. It was established by Hon. Robert W. Furnas in 1859. Mr. McKelvie's success as pub-

lisher of this paper is recognized both at home and abroad. For two years he has served as president of the Associated Farm Papers (incorporated), an organization of national scope and importance. As a successful busi-ness man Mr. McKelvie has an unusual record, for one of his years. An active disposition and a tendency toward public spirited enterprise brought Mr. McKelvie into public work at rather an early period in his business career. As a result he served in the city Councfl of Lincoln several years ago. He was elected a member of the house of representatives from Lancaster county while yet in his twenties. His next step was into the office of lieutenant governor at the age of thirty-one.

This young man is of Scotch ancestry. His father, Sam Mc-Kelvie, has lived upon and operat-ed the same Nebraska farm for




