### This Is The Man

The subject of this sketch was born on a farm in Clay County, near Fairfield, in Nebraska, April 15, 1881. He remained upon the farm until of age, and then entered upon farm paper work. His first experience was as field man. For three years his work took him into all parts of the state. He then became editor, and later principal owner of The Nebraska Farmer, the oldest farm paper west of the Missouri river. It was established by Hon. Robert W. Furnas in 1859.

Mr. McKelvie's success as publisher of this paper is recognized both at home and abroad. For two years he has served as president of the Associated Farm Papers (Incorporated), an organization of national scope and importance. As a successful business man Mr. McKelvie has an unusual record, for one of his years. An active disposition and a tendency toward public spirited enterprise brought Mr. McKelvie into public work at rather an early period in his business career. As a result he served in the city Council of Lincoln several years ago. He was elected a member of the house of representatives from Lancaster county while yet in his twenties. His next step was into the office of lieutenant governor at the age of thirty-one.

This young man is of Scotch ancestry. His father, Sam McKelvie, has lived upon and operated the same Nebraska farm for more than thirty-five years. As a breeder and judge of pure bred stock he has almost a national reputation. The McKelvie farms in Clay county are known even beyond the bounds of Nebraska. It was there that Samuel Roy received his early training and education.

### The "Dry" Amendment

With reference to the Prohibitory Amendment, I am for it, without equivocation, and shall, in the future as I have in the past, do everything that I can to further its success. Furthermore, if I am elected to the responsible position of Governor, I shall enforce the law without fear or favor.

This statement is in keeping with the statement that I made when I first announced my candidacy, and from which I have not deviated in action or word since that time.

In support of my sincerity of purpose, I invite you to witness the fact that when I was a member of the Legislature from Lancaster County, I was elected on the dry platform and was one of the most active dry members in the session of 1911. My affiliations have always been with the dry forces, and of the family of which I am a member, there are seven dry voters, none of whom have ever voted for anything but the dry side of the excise question.
