SORORITIES LEAD FRATS AS SCHOLARS

Averages Compiled at State U Show Girl 'Greeks' Are Best Students.

DELINQUENCY REPORTS MADE

LINCOLN, April 15.—(Special).—University of Nebraska girls, who are members of the fourteen Greek letter societies, again established their supremacy over the members of the twenty Nebraska fraternities in scholarship, according to figures made public yesterday by Dean Engberg of the delinquency committee.

The lowest scholastic standing of any girls' organization was higher than the best in any of the fraternities. The girls had an average delinquency of but 2.9, as compared with 13.2 for the men.

Delta Delta Delta Leads. Delta, Delta, Delta led the sororities with a graded average of 27.5 and delinquency of but 1.3. Acacia was first of the men's organization, with Alpha Theta Chi leading those of the societies belonging to the interfraternity council.

The following table indicates the scholarship of the different organizations, with the first column showing the rank of fraternity or sorority, the second the graded average, which includes the excellence of the work, and the third the delinquency.

Arbor Day Officially Fixed By the Governor's Proclamation

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 15.—(Special).—Governor Morehead this afternoon issued the annual Arbor day proclamation, as follows: "The groves were God's first temples. The cedars of Lebanon are often spoken of, especially in ancient literature, as among the most interesting features of nature. The importance of tree planting cannot be overestimated. A few years ago this state was a vast prairie, stretching out to the west as far as the eye could reach. But with the march of civilization began the planting of trees, until now groves and orchards appear on every hand, dignifying the hills and beautifying the valleys. Much of this has been caused by the inspiration of Arbor day, and has been continued from year to year with great success. With the production of trees has come the feathered tribe, the robin, the wren, the oriole, the bluebird, the thrush and many other ornithological specimens, that cause the morning and evening air to vibrate with their songs and cheer the heart of all that hear. Let us not, therefore, forget this important service which we can render to ourselves and to those who come after us.

Woman Injured by Sudden Stop of Street Car Will Collect \$10,500.

FORT CROOK CASE IS DECIDED

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 15.—(Special).—In opinions handed down by the supreme court this morning, the court affirms the judgment of the Douglas county district court which gave Amy L. Wilson a \$10,500 verdict against the Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway company for injuries received while about to alight from a car caused by the motorman stopping the car so suddenly that she was thrown to the floor of the car and received permanent injuries.

Injunction Will Stand

The supreme court affirms the judgment of the Harpy county district court, covering a suit brought to enjoin the village board of Fort Crook from issuing a saloon license to R. D. Wausel. The opinion is by Judge Rose, who recites "that the village is within two and one-half miles of the Fort Crook military post, which is not maintained exclusively as a signal corps post. The trial court overruled a demurrer to the petition and the defendant refusing to plead further an injunction was granted and the defendant appealed."

No Damage for Delay

"In the absence of a special contract or special circumstances which takes the case out of the general rule, a carrier of live stock is not bound to use extraordinary means to forward a shipment of stock. In such case the shipper will be held to have consented to the carriage of such stock by the regular trains of the carrier on its ordinary schedule."

Must Cover Shafting

"A violation of the statutes requiring the employer to guard shafting is gross negligence," according to the supreme court. The case was one brought by James McCarthy against the village of Ravenna to recover damages for \$20,000 for personal injuries caused by falling from a ladder while whitewashing the walls of the village pumping station, having been caught in the shafting of the pumping machinery and injured.

VOTING ABSENT FROM HOME

Person Must Be in State, but Out side His Own County to Use the Law.

HOW BALLOT MAY BE CAST

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 15.—(Special).—The law regarding voting by mail appears to be not fully understood as regards what constitutes real absence from home. A voter cannot take advantage of the right to send in his vote by mail unless he is absent from the county in which his home is located. If an individual is within the county in which he has a right to vote, he must go to his legal voting place and deposit his ballot in person.

Placed in an envelope upon the back of which the voter shall write the name of the voter and the place where he is entitled to vote and the same shall be signed by the voter.

It shall together with his affidavit be placed in an envelope upon the back of which the voter shall write the name of the voter and the place where he is entitled to vote and the same shall be signed by the voter. However, if the applicant votes in a city where registration is required, he shall hand to the judge of election a copy of his registration signed by the registration clerk of the city, in which the registration was made, which with the ballot shall be returned in the envelope. The envelope shall then be mailed to the clerk of the county in which the voter holds his legal residence. The county clerk shall preserve the envelope unopened until the canvassing board meets to canvass the vote and then shall turn the same over to the board, which shall in the presence of the county clerk and "no other persons," open the same and make the proper entry on the poll book of the voting precinct in which the voter resides. The ballot will then be placed in an envelope and sealed up with the proper endorsement of the board, showing by whom the vote was cast and the voting precinct where the vote should be cast. The members of the board and the county clerk must keep all things secret in connection with the ballot.

LIVERY BARN AND GARAGE AT TUCUMSEH ARE BURNED

TUCUMSEH, Neb., April 15.—(Special).—The big delivery barn of Mason & Brinkley, with the most of the contents and the garage of T. H. Perry & Co., and a part of the contents, were destroyed by fire shortly before midnight Thursday. The fire was discovered in the livery barn, and it is not known what caused it. A lot of hay, an automobile, a horse a mule, some grain, harness, two automobiles and a general line of auto supplies were lost. The livery barn was insured for \$1,000 and Perry & Co. had \$1,000 insurance on their garage, which will partly pay the loss only.

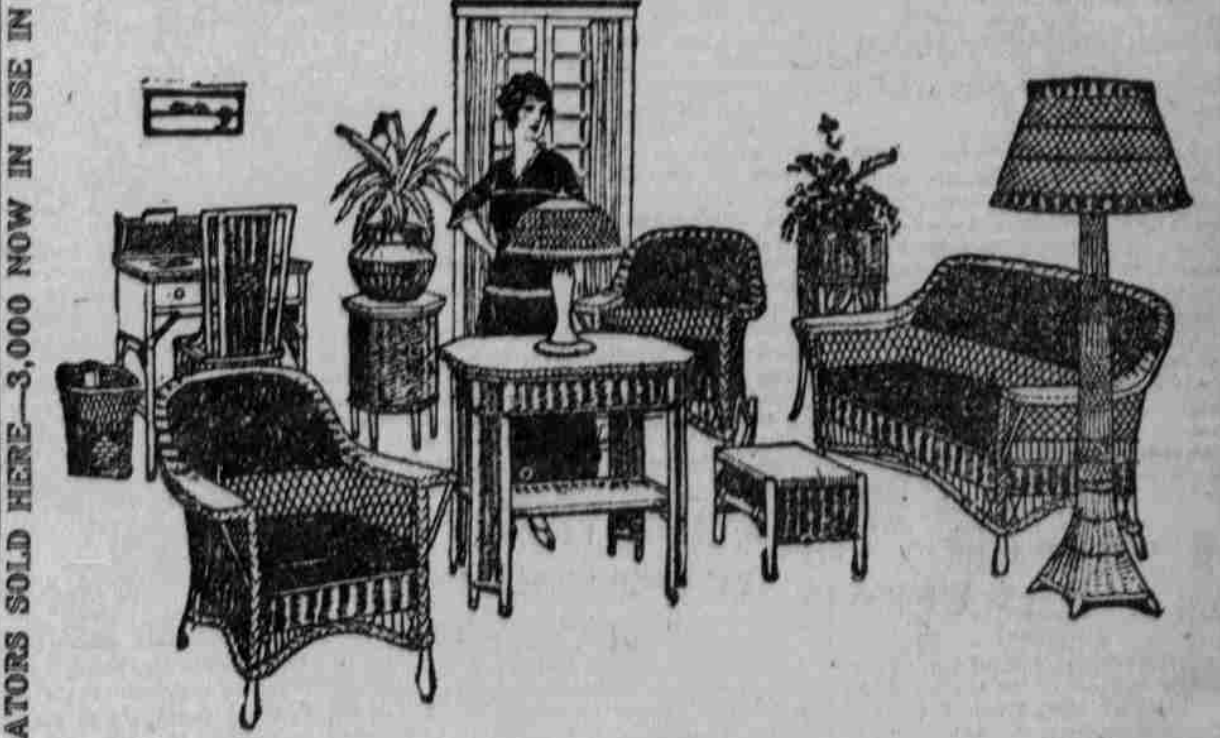
