

POLITICAL TALK FROM MANY MEN

Republicans Aspiring to Nominations Appear Before South Side Crowd.

EVERYTHING MOVES SMOOTHLY

"Rally round the standard!" was the keynote expressed by a majority of candidates for national, state, county and municipal offices at a meeting of 500 republicans at the Red Men hall, South Side, Friday evening.

Former Governor Chester A. Aldrich, Judge Ben S. Baker, Charles P. McGrew, N. H. Loomis and a number of other members of the old guard followed enthusiastically in the path of the chairman and lauded the republican party and its virtues above all others.

One Purpose for All. Charles F. McGrew struck a chord of public favor when he said with emphasis, "We have a fine list of candidates, boys. Line them up and we will give the democrats the worst licking they have had in twenty years."

"I once traveled 1,000 miles in a foreign clime," he remarked in his short speech. "All I had as a weapon was a small piece of paper in the corner of which was forty-eight stars. Yet this piece of paper was all that was needed in any part of the world to convince any human being that I met that I must be respected."

Chester A. Aldrich was there with a summary of his record as a state legislator and governor, saying that he stood on his record alone as a candidate for congress.

Judge A. L. Button pleaded for more unity in the party and aptly remarked that his voice had become as rotten as the democratic platform with so much regular campaigning the last few days.

Local candidates for county and city offices came in for a short halt of the part of the meeting. Henry Murphy, former city attorney and candidate for county attorney, pulled a net over by examining himself leaving the remainder of his last minute's time to his opponent, Palmer, who was present.

A. H. Murdoch, twenty years an attorney of the South Side, pleaded for support for nomination to the office of municipal judge. Wesley Adkins, P. J. Trainor, John Larsen, W. R. Wall, E. Erickson, J. W. Reel, Carl Johnson, Beecher Higby and Nels A. Lundgren were presented as candidates for the state legislature. Higby and J. Morrison talked for nomination to the office of state senator.

Urge Some Form of War Draft in Canada

OTTAWA, Ont., April 15.—National registration, with a view to some form of conscription, was urged upon President Borden and members of his cabinet today by a delegation representing forty-two recruiting leagues of Ontario, the maritime provinces and the west. They told the premier that the present voluntary system was not getting enough men.

The premier, in reply, did not commit his government to any expression of opinion as to the merits, either of conscription or the voluntary system, but indicated the delegation that there had not been as much talk of recruits since men were coming forward at the rate of 100 a day.

Omaha Rotarians are planning a surprise of such a novel nature for the convention of the International Association of Rotary Clubs, which will be held in Cincinnati from July 16 to 20, inclusive, that it will make delegates from all parts of the United States 'sit up and take notice,' according to Dan A. Johnson, secretary of the local organization.

The game of "watchful waiting" is being played by local members of the Rotary club, who plan to attend the big international meeting. Rumor has it that the Omaha delegates will get a line on the stunts planned by Rotarians from other cities and then attempt to work up the "star act" of the convention.

Will Be Honeymoon Camp. The executive committee has advised the local Rotary club that it has already received over 200 reservations for hotel accommodations in Cincinnati during the week of the convention. Aing though conventions are not considered the ideal plumage for newly married couples, it is known that the Cincinnati affair will be the honeymoon camp of at least two bridal couples from the west—and although none of the locals will admit it, there is a rumor that the Nebraska delegation has instructions to tune up the wedding bells.

A few others have revealed their "stunt" plans to the convention. Waterloo, Ia., Rotarians will invade the Ohio city with their Order of the Black Hawk and endeavor to initiate every visitor to the convention into the "mystery" of this fun makers' "Indian" organization. They will erect a big Indian wigwam on Fountain square—the center of the business district of Cincinnati.

Trophy for Champ Golfer. A silver pitcher as a trophy for the Rotary golf tournament is to be offered by the Kansas City delegation. Local devotees of the "nineteenth hole" and the other eighteen aver that they will win the pitcher if the Omaha champions of the Rotary club make the trip to Cincinnati.
