STUDY OF ELECTRICAL STORM

Speed of Lightning Plashes and Safety.

A study of electrical storms by O. S. Peters, a physicist of the bureau of standards. Department of Commerce shows that a flash of lightning, usually consisting of several separate discharges, nay not last altogether longer than ia-E.,000 of a second. Each of the discharges composing the stroke may not hat over 1-25,000 of a second, and is trequently as brief as 1-200,000 of a second.

The flash may contain 5,000 ampered of electricity, and this entire quantity may be discharged with a force of more than 500,000 volts. It has been estimated that a flash of lightning a mile long may deliver tis stroke with a force of 1,000,000 volts, of which \$5,000 is required to break down the air in the path of the flash. No place in the path of a thunderstorm

is safe from being struck by lightning. but the thing that is least likely to be hit my a bolt is a house equipped with lightning rods. The next safest place, according to Peters, is an unprotected house. A current of hot air ascending from a chimney is apt to attract a stroke, and people should not stand near stoves or other metal objects, including phones and

'Out of doors,' he says, "the most dangerous places are evidently in open fields under toolsted trees, and near wire fences. Small sheds and other shelters are almost equally dangerous as isolated trees, especially if the sheds are in the open away from larger buildings. Thick timber is undoubtedly the safest place to suck out of doors.

"A place of complete safety," he adds. may be found only in a space surrounded by a metal network, in a steel frame Building or in an anderground chamber.
