

NEW JUDGE STARTS CAREER WITH RUSH

Judge Joseph W. Woodrough Imposes Sentences on Fourteen Federal Prisoners.

TWO MANN ACT VIOLATIONS

Fourteen federal prisoners were sentenced to terms varying from thirty days to two and a half years by Judge Joseph W. Woodrough within the first twenty-four hours of his career as a federal judge.

The first man sentenced by him was Frank McCann, charged with violating the Mann act. Judge Woodrough sentenced him to one year in the Lancaster county jail.

The longest sentence imposed by the new judge was on Clyde Taylor, who pleaded guilty to forgery of a postal savings bank certificate. He was sent to the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan., for two years and six months.

Given Himself Up. William Jerwick was sentenced to a year and a day in the Leavenworth prison. He pleaded guilty to a violation of the Mann act in taking a girl from Omaha to St. Paul, Minn., September 1, 1915. Jerwick fled to New Orleans, where a few weeks ago he walked into a newspaper office and told him he was what he wanted. The United States marshal was called and he was taken in custody. Later he made an affidavit stating what he had done and it was on this affidavit that he was brought back to Omaha.

Walter H. Van Gordon, former bellhop at the Lindell hotel in Lincoln, who stole a mail sack at the Union station transfer, was sent to the Douglas county jail for four months.

Fred V. Jackson, charged with stealing a parcel post package at the Union station, was sent to the Leavenworth prison for a year and a day.

William Weaver, who represented himself as a United States credit service man and secured \$25 from A. C. Castle while a guest at the Castle hotel, and who was brought back from the east, was sentenced to a year and a half in the Leavenworth prison.

George W. Hilliard, charged with obstructing the mails by taking a letter from the postoffice at Columbus, Neb., which was addressed to J. L. Hilliard, was fined \$50.

Virgil Price was given sixty days for having "doped" in his destination and dispensing H. Russell Larkin and Jess Nolan were given thirty days each for violation of the "dope" law.

For robbing box cars, John Miller, Fred Rogers and Paul Wilson each received sentences of six months in jail.
