It originally was prepared as a circular note to other powers, but it later was decided to issue it as a statement.

"In brief a neutral government may proceed upon the presumption that an armed merchant vessel of belligerent nationality is armed for aggression, while a belligerent should proceed on the prosumption that the vessel is armed for protection. Both of these presumptions may be overcome by evidence-the first secondary or collateral evidence since the fact to be established is negative in character; the second by primary and direct evidence since the fact to be estab-

Army Deserts and Will Attack Peking

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 26.-A rebel advance on Peking, the capital of China, has been ordered by the Chinese revolutionists, according to a Shangual dispatch to the Chinese Republic association here today.

An army of several thousand troops under Luy Ung-Ting, formerly confmander of Yuan Shi Kai's forces in Kwang SI province, and General Lunk Chi Kwang, formerly with the government troops in Kwang Tung, will begin the march upon Feking soon.
