#### HOWARD TO HAVE OPPOSITION

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 26 .- (Special.) - The democratic plot thickens. There is every indication as the official returns come in that Lieutenant Governor James Pearson of Morefield has received the populist renomination for lieutenant governor

This will make hard sledding for Edgar Howard, who has received the democratic nomination, for if Mr. Pearson sticks and makes the race it is probable that the bulk of the anti-Bryan vote will go to Mr. Pearson, as it is well known that the Hitchcock crowd is somewhat bitter toward Howard for lining up with the Bryan bunch.

Democrats in Lincoln today, who are close to Mr. Pearson say that he to decide the tie by flipping a coin. will accept the nomination and make the race and that if he does he will receive the almost unanimous support of the anti-Bryan crowd.


