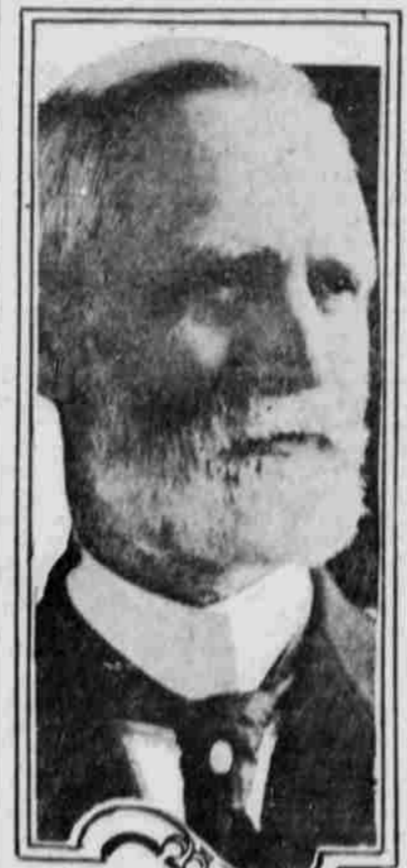
DEATH RECORD.

TO WIND UP AFFAIRS OF DEFUNCT CONCERN

Publication Starts Investigation Into Receivership Which May Soon Be Closed.

THE PAPERS ARE ALL MISSING

The account in The Bee not long ago of the case in the justice court in which R. B. Howell, general manager of the water works, was defending his right to hold out \$1 as agent's commission from a \$5 premium on his own surety bond as receiver of a defunct concern, seems to have started something.

An effort to locate the case led to a search for the original file of "Docket 7, No. 312, Henry C. Wells vs. Merchants and Manufacturers Mutual Fire Insurance company, R. B. Howell, receiver." In the office of the district clerk, which however, failed to reveal the missing papers.

It cost R. Beecher Howell \$13.33 to get the job of national committeeman, according to his expense account, filed with the election commission. He also paid \$50 for eighteen legislative candidates pledged to his electric light propaganda.

documents "There should be a slip to show who has the papers," he added. From other documents it is disclosed that R. B. Howell, who was appointed receiver of the defunct company by Judge Estelle September 30, 1903, made a report of receivership expenses August 4, 1903, when he was allowed \$1,330 as full commission to that date.

The last report filed by Receiver Howell was approved by Judge Reed August 4, 1903. The judge allowed \$1,000.83 for various expenses and an amount of \$1,330 to Receiver Howell, being pay at the rate of \$60 per month for twenty-two months. The court also ordered payment of a 20 per cent dividend on claims allowed and the collection of assessments from members of the mutual company.

When Journal book No. 130 was requested, the filing clerk stated that an attorney had taken it to his office for use in lieu of the original documents in the case. Further inquiry revealed the fact that Mr. Howell within a comparatively few days directed the attorney for the receivership to prepare a final report, which is to be forthcoming before long.

SABIN FINED IN FEDERAL COURT; HE PLEADED GUILTY

Alexander C. Sabin was fined \$300 by Judge Woodruff in federal court Tuesday after he had pleaded guilty to the charge against him. It was charged that he conducted, through the mails, a medical business, going about the country securing patients for a medical institution which, he alleged, existed in Omaha; with a large staff of skilled physicians, but which, it was alleged, does not exist. It was also alleged that he secured sums of money and property from persons to whom he promised cures, and to whom, in some cases, he represented that they were suffering from diseases that could be cured by the alleged fictitious medical institute.
