LIVE STOCK BOARD RAISES VARIOUS QUARANTINE ORDERS

The board at its meeting here yesterday further made order that cattle, sheep and swine shipments originating in territory east of the Mississippi river and the state of Minnesota and north of the Tennessee-Kentucky state line, or any part of such territory shall not enter the state of Nebraska unless loaded in cars which have been previously cleaned and disinfected.

CANADA EXPECTS SHORTAGE OF MEN FOR THE HARVEST

FREMONT, Neb., April 27.—(Special.)—Canada is sending thousands of young men to the war, with the result that only the boys, cripples and old men are left in many towns and communities, according to Herman Wunderling, a former Fremont, who is provincial inspector for the Canadian government, with offices at Victoria. There are 150,000 Canadian troops engaged in the European war and 150,000 more troops in training. There will be a big shortage of farm hands for spring work, Mr. Wunderling said.

WANT TORNADO SUITS BEFORE SUPREME JUDGES

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 27.—(Special.)—Application was made to the supreme court today to have two cases involving suits caused by the Omaha tornado, removed

from the supreme court commission to the supreme court. The grounds given for the application are that the suits involve important principles of law, which have never been decided in this state and that there are few precedents from other states. The point to be decided is whether buildings belonging to Martin Witz,

which were destroyed by the tornado were first struck by lightning and burned. The suits are against the Girard Fire and Marine Insurance company and the American Insurance company, which had insured the buildings against fire and lightning.

STATE BOARD EMPLOYS SHEEP AS LAWN MOWERS

LINCOLN, April 27.—(Special.)—The State Board of Agriculture has made new arrangements for mowing the state fair grounds this year and will not resort to the usual mower to keep down the

weeds.
