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McCormick Wins the Draw to Decide Tie Vote on Nomination

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., April 28.—(Special.)—The contest between two candidates for supervisor in one of the Hall county districts was settled today by the canvassing board. The various interested parties met with the board and a further protest was made with reference to the accuracy of the count. In the presence of all the contestants the board again made the recount. And, to order to be doubly certain, recounted the ballots for the third time. The result no longer being questioned, it was decided that one of the officers put two slips in one hat, one bearing the name of Mr. Cates and the other the name of Mr. McCormick, the contestants, and a member of the present board of supervisors then blindly drew one of the slips. It bore the name of Mr. McCormick and his name will be placed on the ballot as the regular nominee.

Dodge County Gives Hughes Majority

Efficiency Compound Runs Counter of Law

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, April 28.—(Special.)—Oil Commissioner C. E. Harman has been informed that an effort is being made by a concern in Cincinnati, O., to sell in Nebraska a liquid which is alleged to increase the efficiency of gasoline. The company sells territory and furnishes the stuff at the rate of \$2 per quart. So far as he has been able to discover the commissioner finds that the liquid is composed mostly of gasoline with some kind of ingredient in it and that an analysis will be made to discover what it contains and its value as an efficiency agent when mixed with gasoline.
