WORLD STILL IN ROUGH, SAYS PROF.

Prof. T. M. Carver, Harvard Economist, Declares World is Yet Unfinished.

EVERYTHING IS ON TRIAL

"This is an unfinished world," said Prof. T. M. Carver of the chair of political economy of Harvard university, in a short talk at the noon luncheon of the University club.

"Yes, it seems to me I detect something of that idea in the small child, the idea of liking to be free to govern itself rather than to be governed by someone else. But that does not make democracy the ultimate system of government. Merely because we like the idea."

"No, we have not yet found the ultimate religion, the ultimate philosophy, the ultimate form of government, or the ultimate system of morality. Forms of government, systems of morality and these things have their struggle for existence just as much as horns and hoofs, wings or fangs, talons or claws."

Women's Training Camp is Opened at Washington

WASHINGTON, May 1.—A woman's military training camp, said to be the first in the country, was formally opened here today with exercises, attended by President Wilson and other officials.

President Wilson in his address said: "God forbid that the United States should be drawn into war, but if it should be America would shake itself out of a dream and say to any one who doubts the spirit of the new world that it still speaks the voice of humanity."
