lean food to the French civilian population at the town in which the headquarters is located and in the neighboring village. They also conferred with members of the American commission for relief in Belgium, who arrived on a special train from Brussels for that purpose.

Washington is Hopeful

WASHINGTON, May 3.—The announcement from Berlin that new and definite instructions are to be given to German submarine commanders is the first positive indication of how Germany will attempt to meet President Wilson's final demand that it declare and effect an abandonment of the present methods of submarine warfare.

Whether the new instructions will meet the terms of the last American note and thus prevent a break in diplomatic relations can only be determined by a close and careful examination.

President Wilson is represented by those closest about him as unshaken in his determination that the issue is not negotiable; that a settlement cannot be delayed by discussion of side issues such as the British blockade and retaliatory measures; that the controversy between the countries can proceed further in diplomacy only if Germany effectually stops destruction of ships without warning and takes measures to bring its submarine operations otherwise within the confines of international law.

The news that new instructions to submarine commanders will be announced served to encourage hope of a favorable outcome of the long dispute, but all comment is being reserved until the newest German communication can be thoroughly considered.

ACCUSED OF FALSE ENTRIES IN BOOKS

Former Bookkeeper in Iowa National Arrested by United States Officer.

WILL WAIVE HIS PRELIMINARY

DES MOINES, May 3.—(Special Telegram.)—Accused of making false entries in books of Iowa National bank to hide a shortage of about \$3,000. A Lyle Bradley, aged 27, former bookkeeper, was arrested by Deputy United States Marshal VanDerweil last night.

He was released on \$1,000 bonds and will be arraigned before United States Commissioner Pittsinnons. Bradley declared that he will waive to the federal grand jury to escape publicity of a public preliminary hearing. He refused to comment upon his arrest.

Bradley was discharged from the employ of the bank three months ago following the discovery of the shortage. The shortage was created in small amounts taken during a period of two years, according to representatives of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty company, who signed Bradley's bond as bookkeeper in the bank.

Investigates Mysterious Fire. The state fire marshal is investigating the mysterious burning of the barn of Tom Scott, a farmer near Perry, in which nine horses were burned to death last Wednesday night. No clue as to the origin of the fire has as yet been obtained.

Cascade Branch Line Case. By a decision of two to one the State Board of Railroad Commissioners today refused to recommend the making over of the Cascade branch of the Milwaukee from a narrow gauge to a standard gauge road.

Rules Against Chiropractor. The supreme court in a decision handed down today affirmed the district court of Story county, H. E. Fry, judge, in its finding against H. A. A. Edmunds for practicing medicine without a license. Edmunds is a "chiropractor."

May Open Coal Mines. Coal mines may be reopened at Sawn, Ia., on the Rock Island some fifteen miles southeast of Des Moines. Several years ago there were thriving coal mines at this point, but they were worked out and the field abandoned. It is believed that there is still coal to be found in paying quantities there and a company has been prospecting there of late.

Help Police for Help. Mrs. M. G. Minolin, 35 years old, a bride of a few weeks, deserted her home for the police station last night because of trouble with her own mother and her husband. She asked the police to let her stay at the station awhile.

SPANISH STEAMSHIP SUNK BY SUBMARINE. LONDON, May 3.—The sinking by a submarine of another neutral steamship, the Spanish vessel Vinifreda, is reported in a Lloyd's dispatch from Coruna, Spain. One member of the crew was lost.

The Vinifreda, 1,441 tons gross and 290 feet long, was built in Sunderland, England, in 1899 and owned in Bilbao.

The winner will go to Lake Mohonk, N. Y., to represent the western group in the national peace contest.

Nebraska will be represented Friday evening by Waldo E. Shillington of Creighton, who recently won in the intercollegiate contest of Nebraska. The contestants from the different states and their subjects are:

Waldo E. Shillington, Creighton university, "The Foundation of Peace"; Clarinda Haringhurst, Kansas university, "The Coming Conflict"; Francis Case, Dakota Wesleyan university, "The Modern Jewell College (Missouri)"; "The Suicide of Civilization (Iowa)"; "The Paramount Issue."

The orators will be limited to speeches of fifteen minutes' duration.

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Several Killed in May-Day Peace Riots in Germany

LONDON, May 3.—(Serious trouble is reported to have occurred in Berlin and elsewhere in Germany on May day, says the Amsterdam correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph company. "Vast crowds composed for the most part of women of the laboring classes clamored for peace. The crowds were dispersed by the police and many persons were arrested. Two women were wounded at Chemnitz, Saxony."

A Geneva telegram to the Central News says: "During food riots at Leipzig the police killed three persons and wounded seventy. In riots in Berlin it is reported twenty-five persons were killed and 200 wounded."

Bulgaria Not Trying to Make a Separate Peace

BERLIN, May 3.—(By Wireless to Sayville.)—A semi-official telegram from Sofia characterizes as untrue the reports recently circulated that Bulgaria was attempting to arrange a separate peace. "The Bulgarian telegraphic agency declares untrue the report that a Geneva government minister at Bulgaria, M. Tonchev, and the Bulgarian attaché at Switzerland, M. Tschervenakov, together with a Turkish delegate opened peace negotiations with the entente," the Overseas News agency says.

"This false rumor probably originated in the trip of M. Tonchev and M. Tschervenakov to Geneva, where they had business which was in no way connected with war or peace."

Official denial was made in London recently of reports that semi-official negotiations were in progress with a view to arranging a separate peace between Great Britain and Bulgaria.
