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GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Brisk Demand Offsets Heavy Receipts of Wheat and Prices Run Unchanged to Higher.

CASH DEMAND FOR CORN SLOW. OMAHA, May 6, 1916. Grain receipts were very heavy again today and there was a general advance in prices.

Wheat receipts were exceptionally heavy for this time of the year and there was an active cash demand for this cereal. The bulk of the No. 3 hard winter wheat sold at prices ranging from \$1.06 to \$1.07, and a few cars of better quality brought \$1.08-1.09. Four hard wheat receipts to the tune of 10,000 bushels were made at advanced prices. The market was quoted from unchanged to a half cent higher.

The corn market was active, but the sales were light. There was a fair demand for oats and the market sold from unchanged to a quarter higher. Live was quoted a cent up. Harley advanced a cent. Clearances were flat and flour equal to 1,350,000 bushels.

Liverpool close: Wheat, unchanged; corn, unchanged; flour, unchanged. Primary wheat receipts were 29,000 bushels and shipments, 67,000 bushels, against receipts of 88,000 bushels and shipments of 75,000 bushels last year.

Primary corn receipts were 62,000 bushels and shipments, 60,000 bushels, against receipts of 32,000 bushels and shipments of 68,000 bushels last year. Primary oats receipts were 122,000 bushels and shipments, 122,000 bushels, against receipts of 118,000 bushels and shipments of 118,000 bushels last year.

CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS

Features of the Trading and Closing Prices on Board of Trade. CHICAGO, May 6—Crop damage from green bugs andessian fly took first place today in the attention of the wheat trade. Largely presents picture of a closed today, largely higher, with May at \$1.14 and July at \$1.18. Corn gained 1/2 cent, oats 1/4 cent, and provisions 5 to 2 1/2.

Although at the outset the wheat market appeared to be chiefly affected by the general confidence that a break with Germany had been averted, the fact soon became evident that the bulls were laying much more emphasis on reports indicating danger of widespread ravages by pests attacking the already much diminished winter crop in leading export areas. A word that a continued increase of green bugs in Oklahoma appeared likely, and another word that Kansas was responsible for an assertion that Kansas was facing a heavy fly in twenty-nine counties.

Missouri and Illinois advices also gave prominence to details of havoc by heaviest fly. In the latter trading the Kansas crop situation became more and more a dominating influence. It was said an exceptionally cool wet season would be expected to offset the fly. Various weather complaints were numerous meanwhile from Nebraska.

Corn and oats rose in sympathy with wheat. For the most part, trading in corn was of a local character. Data were being supplied by local shipping demand here and at Milwaukee.
