LINCOLN NABS SOUTHPAW MILL

Pitcher Halla Holds Omaha to Eight Hits While Links Make Thirteen Off Krause.

EX-ROURCES SECURE REVENGE

LINCOLN, Neb., May 8.—(Special Telegram.)—The batting of Arlie Thomason and Henry Johnson, two ex-Rourkes, helped Holmes' gang to beat Omaha here this afternoon, 5 to 3. Thomason got three hits and Johnson put the ball over the left field fence, putting Lincoln in the lead.

Harry Krause was on the mound for the Rourkes and was hit freely, the ducklings getting thirteen singles. He was opposed by Halla, another left-hander.

Lincoln started scoring in the first when Hinchman doubled, but was out at home trying to score on Thomason's single. Thomason took second on the play and scored on Lober's single. Omaha evened it up in the second on Miller's two-ply swat and Kilduff's single.

Krause Come Back Hard. The ducklings put across two more in the second on a mixture of errors and one hit and then Krause's triple came back with two in the fourth. Forsythe walked and ambled to second when Williams scored Halla's throw. Krause singled, scoring Forsythe and scored himself a minute later on Miller's safe swat.

Krause pitched himself out of a tight hole in the fifth when three Lincoln men hit safely, but he fanned the next two and forced Williams to end up a weak fly for the third out without a score coming across.

Johnson put the game on ice in the sixth with his long drive over the left field fence.
