NOT MUCH MONEY TO SPEND

(From a Staff Correspondent) LINCOLN, May 12 .- (Special.)-The State Normal board held a regular session today in the normal hoard rooms in the cellar of the state house. Most of the members this time talked to each other without getting hostile.

The main business of the session is to arrange for the expenditure of funds in the hands of the state treasurer. The appropriation of the legislature for the blennium of 1913-14 was made a sum based on 50 per cent of 80-100 of 1-mill tax levy. The other 10 per cent is now available and makes an amount in the neighborhood of \$59,000. The board had figured that the amount might possibly run up to \$86,000, but according to State Treasurer Hall the sum will just reach the first figures. 
