Elephant Butte Dam, Largest in World, Finished

ELEPHANT BUTTE, N. M., May 12.—Work was completed here today on the Elephant Butte dam, a United States reclamation project, which by damming the Rio Grande river forms the greatest storage reservoir in the world.

The dam blocks a canyon on the Rio Grande 130 miles north of El Paso. It is the fifth of the government's big irrigation projects and will store the entire flow and flood of the river.

At times as many as 100,000 persons lived in the town, whose government was entirely under the jurisdiction of the engineers. A railway was constructed through thirteen miles of rough country to connect the camp with a main line railroad.

Commerce High Holds an Election
