OTTO MERZ STOPS HAUGHTY WOLVES

Jacksonians Have But One Chance to Score and Swell Throw by Smith Blasts Opportunity.

WIN GAME IN FIRST INNING

The honor, glory and distinction of hurling the first shut-out frayed of Omaha fell upon big Otto Merz yesterday. Otto twirled masterful ball for Pa's de luxe athletes yesterday, with the result that the haughty Wolves from Wichita were blanked with a string of goose eggs which failed to hatch, while the Rourkees ran up two runs in the opening stanza and won the event by that margin.

Merz displayed nifty form yesterday and the Jacksonian crew failed utterly to solve his baffling slants. Only on one occasion did they have a chance to chalk up a run, and a swell throw to the plate by Earl Smith blasted the chance.

Caught Standing Up

It happened in the opening stanza. Bill Fox opened the game by beating out a dinky infielder. On a hit and run play Tobin rolled the ball through Krug's position when Marty went over to cover second base, and Fox hiked to third. Herling skied a drive into Smith's waiting and eager hands. Fox started for the home, the minute Smith nipped the pill, but, although he is a mighty fast man, he wasn't fast enough to beat Earl's peg to the rubber. The ball arrived, swift and true, several feet ahead of Fox and the Wichita outfielder was nailed standing up.

Only on one other occasion did one of Jackson's curly wolves reach third base and with two down Merz whiffed the batter who might have sent him home.

Old Jim Durham, who still gets by because he knows all the tricks of the pitching art and who has always had something on Omaha, chucked for Wichita yesterday and Jim did a fairly good job at that. But he couldn't stop as lively as Merz.

Win Game in First

The Rourkeevians nipped him for four safe knocks in the first round and scored the two runs which were sufficient to cold-storage the game. After Smith went out Krug drove a drive into right and he raced all the way home on Cy Forsythe's double down the first base line. Cyrus took third on the throw back to the diamond. Ray Miller lammed one clear through Britton and the Tango Kid lumbered home.

The Rourkees hit Durham at intervals during the rest of the game, but could never quite deliver in the pinches after the first frame. Marty Krug had his slugging eye working to perfection and made three hits and a sacrifice in four trips to the platter for a perfect average. Bill Fox of the opposition also made three hits.

PHILLIES WIN FOUR IN ROW OFF REDS

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) MANILA, April 15.—After more than six months of negotiation, the Philippine government has abandoned, for the time being at least, the project to finance a sugar central on the rich sugar-producing island of Negros. It is more than a year ago that the insular legislature authorized the expenditure of \$1,000,000 gold, for the construction of a modern central plant. It was hoped that this would be the forerunner of others, some built by the government, others by the planters themselves.

Fails in Attempt to Get Sugar Factory

Under the terms of the law, the government was to be the chief investor in a corporation formed by the planters who would benefit by the central. The debt to the government would be paid off gradually and ultimately the planters would be the sole owners of the corporation.

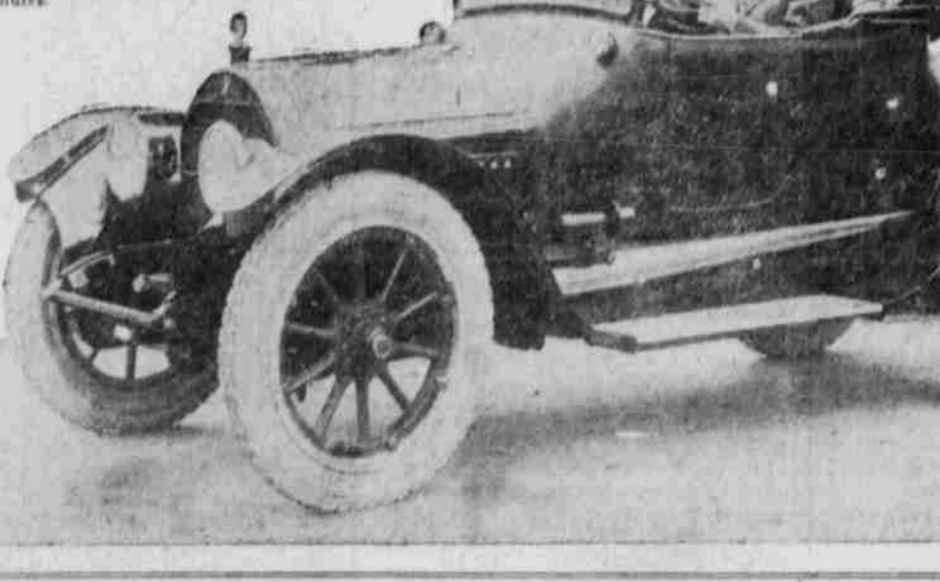
