MOVE TO ORGANIZE ALL EMPLOYERS

Manufacturers Wish More Composite Expression From Men Engaged in Business.

LAWYERS NOT MADE BY PRODUCERS

New York, May 17.—Declaring there is a necessity for a more composite expression of the opinion of business men and employers respecting national governmental policies affecting the development of the country's industrial possibilities the National Association of Manufacturers approved today the organization of the National Business Mens association to which every employer of labor would be eligible.

James A. Emery, general counsel of the association, in an address on "The General Legislative Situation as Affecting Industry," declared that in the last decade "the tendency of legislation has indicated a dominant governmental belief that in the making and executive administration of law it has been more important to cherish business than to encourage it."

The speaker declared that the "anti-trust acts" passed by the last congress were "inspired, shaped and pressed" by the representatives of non-industrial constituents. The same situation was true of the present congress.

"The twelve leading industrial states," Mr. Emery continued, "California, Indiana, Illinois, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, neither contributed to the membership of the sub-committee of the house which first formulated the trust legislation, nor with a single exception were these states represented in the majority of the conference committees of the house or senate which practically remade the trade commission and the Clayton act."

HILL COMMENTS ON WAGE INCREASE

Great Northern Magnate Says Employees Have Chosen Bad Time For Striking.

REFERENCE TO "AFTER WAR"

The continued reference to a probable early peace in Europe makes the problems that will face American business "after the war" one of the chief factors in the discussion of the proposed wage increase of 25 per cent demanded by 309,000 engineers and trainmen.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat has handled this subject admirably in an editorial, in which that newspaper calls attention to the recent remarks of James J. Hill, chairman of the executive board and former president of the Great Northern railroad.

"James J. Hill expresses a thought which must have occurred to many minds in saying that railway employees have chosen a BAD TIME FOR STRIKING, in view of the great probability that railway traffic in this country WILL FALL OFF ENORMOUSLY immediately upon the ending of the war."

Employees' Point of View

"Looked at from another point of view—that of the employees—it may seem a propitious moment to win. The lines are now getting and handling the great volume of business, and it must have impressed the opportunists among the men that they can be forced, as a means of keeping the traffic moving, to accede to demands."

"It is no doubt a part of the theory of the employees that if higher wages are conceded now their organizations will be strong enough successfully to resist any effort to reduce them later on."
