

SOUNDS KEYNOTE OF IOWA CAMPAIGN

Failure of Wilson Administration to Keep Pledges Is Issue, Says Chairman Clark.

WOULD ENDORSE COMMISSION

Cedar Rapids, Ia., May 17.—An eloquent plea for endorsement of Senator Albert B. Cummins, of Iowa, for the presidency of the United States was made today by Howard J. Clark of Des Moines, in his keynote speech as temporary chairman of the first republican state convention in session here.

Mr. Clark said in part: "The great central west has taken an active and determined part in developing the principles of republicanism and the foremost effective, able exponent and leader is Iowa's candidate for the republican nomination for the presidency, Senator Cummins."

The speaker dwelt at great length on the part played by Senator Cummins in the various political activities of recent years and reviewed in detail his acts as a member of the United States senate. He added: "We have a candidate with strength, wisdom, character, and experience who has been a leader among his people, a man whose strength has been expended for the benefit of the whole country."

National Issues. The speaker then plunged into a discussion of national issues during which he said:

"Concerning that present administration which has acted in good faith in every particular and that it has used its best endeavor to formulate and put into effect policies which it believed to be in the best interests of the country, yet it has so signally failed in all of the essentials that if the republicans are true to their principles and have the courage of their convictions and nominate men for public office who are known to be in accord with the public sentiment of the country, the victory will be overwhelming at the November election."

Regarding questions growing out of the European war, Mr. Clark said in part:

"The true, fundamental doctrine of the American republic is that every American, wherever he may be, is bound to the protection and enforcement of his rights, whether they involve his person or his property, and the failure of the democratic administration in the lack of courage and ability in prosecuting and compelling compliance with it. When a people cease to believe in the principles and the rights of the country to which they owe allegiance, they are no longer citizens of that country. We do not forget the admonition of the father of our country that we should protect our rights, but we should not sacrifice them at the altar of expediency."

Mexican Situation. Much time was devoted by the temporary chairman to a discussion of the Mexican situation and to the problems to be solved in dealing with the southern republic. Regarding the Philippines the speaker said:

"American people are not ready or willing to relinquish their obligation solemnly assumed, because of our incident, to the maintenance of the peace and the obligation in good faith and with due regard for the rights of others, to protect the sacrifice it may require."

If we are to continue to maintain our position as one of the powers of the earth and so develop our strength for the betterment of mankind, the commercial relations, it is expected to be a commercial nation which take part in the world's affairs, we must establish and maintain the principle that the high seas are for our use and the traffic of all other nations must be free and unimpeded, and we must at the same time develop a sufficient merchant marine to be a factor in the control of ocean-carrying trade. In order to do either of these and as a factor in determining the policy of our foreign relations, we are brought face to face with the question of preparedness.

Larger Army Needed. The standing army should be maintained with sufficient numbers and location to insure the protection of our transportation facilities, be mobilized at any point to give additional assistance made necessary by any threatened attack or invasion. All the remaining portions of the army should be developed through the National Guard of the respective states. This country should keep clear and free from any military or military in any form whatsoever.

Incidental to our preparedness for defense is the government should lead, foster and build and manufacture all equipment and munitions of war.

Effective legislation must be enacted that will fully safeguard the public health and prohibit the employment of children, limit labor of women and those who must labor between the years of childhood and maturity, to protect wage earners from the hazardous occupation and to enact a law which liberal compensation for workmen in hazardous occupation and to enact a law which will secure for the aged and infirm a certain living, educational and occupational opportunities.

Expansion of Suffrage. The republican party in this state is for the expansion of suffrage and in the extent that women shall be given the right to vote. This should be universal and general throughout the country. It has also broad, genuine, and honest suffrage, but it is certain that expansion of suffrage would be the only way that democracy and its principles of justice and liberty would be maintained.

Have and beyond everything else, the republican party stands for the maintenance of the American flag, and stands for America first, last, and all the time and without divided allegiance. Any other citizenship is no citizenship at all and should be treated as an enemy to our flag, our institutions and to our country.

London, May 17.—The British monitor M-30 has been destroyed, it was officially announced this evening.

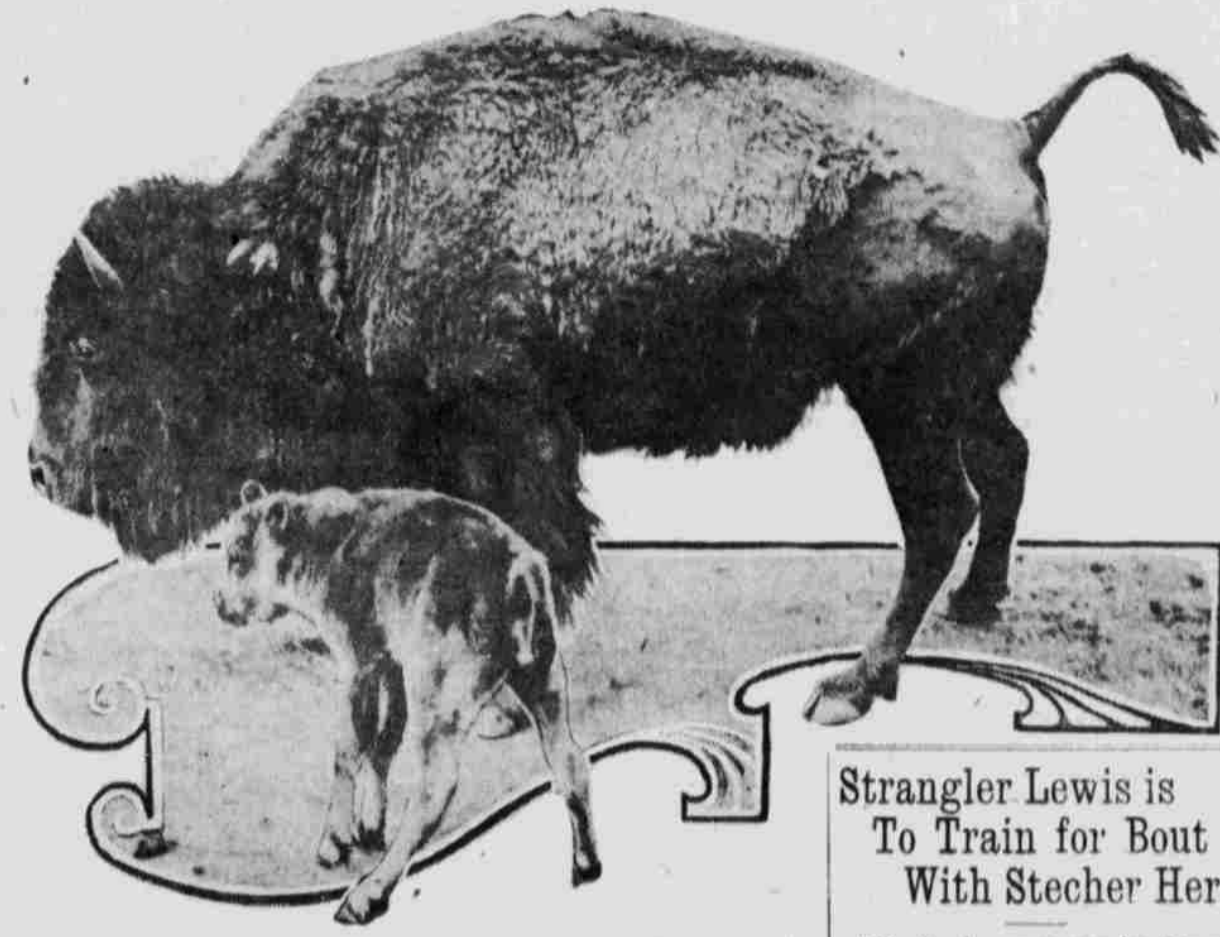
DRYS GET SIGNATURES TO PETITIONS AT RALSTON

Former Treasurer of Kansas Predicts Republican Victory

After spending a few days here visiting relatives and friends and sounding out the political situation, E. E. Grimes, former state treasurer of Kansas, is returning to his home in Topeka. He is actively interested in the candidacy of Senator John W. Weeks and will be one of the men in charge of the Weeks headquarters at the Chicago convention.

"There is no question in my mind," says Mr. Grimes, "but that the republicans will elect the president in 1916, and that the republicans and progressives are going to work harmoniously, because all are anxious for a change in national affairs and want the country again under republican administration."

"I believe the tariff is going to be one of the main issues as well as President Wilson's deficiency in handling foreign affairs. I am confident it will be a regular landslide for the republican nominee."

Asked as to prospects of the different candidates for nomination, he said: "I do not know, but I believe, with the many excellent candidates, one will be selected who will unite all elements. I believe the delegates will have the best interests of the party at heart and will stand by their favorite candidate, but I do not expect any hasty action or that anyone is going to be nominated without due consideration. I also believe each and every candidate will be treated out to see who is most available."

"It goes without saying that I believe Senator John W. Weeks, of Massachusetts, stands as good a show for the nomination as any candidate mentioned. All who know him speak of him only in the highest terms, and whenever you find a man who knows Senator Weeks, you will always hear a kind word in his behalf; that he is a broadminded, equitable and fair man and would deal justly with all."

"Senator Weeks seems to me to enjoy the kind feeling as second choice of most of the candidates and many of the delegates."
