Club Women Going East Pass Through Omaha Saturday

Saturday is to be a sort of gala day for Omaha club women. The biennial convention of Women's clubs of the United States is to be held in New York City, May 23 to the west will pass through Omaha.

Stahl, who is the guest of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Gosney, will tell of the plans for the big suffrage parade in Chicago June 7, during the national republican convention. She will also speak of Chicago suffragists plan for "White Elephant" day.

Miss Lillie Starr will tell some of her observations of the practical working of the ballot, as used by Chicago women. Miss Starr is visiting Mrs. George H. Blich, a former friend, in Chicago. Miss Starr is active in organizations whose principal work is looking after crippled children. Miss Starr also attended the convention of the Episcopal missionary societies here.

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
