DRY PETITION IS FILED AT LINCOLN

Workers for Prohibition March to Capitol and Turn Over Huge List.

GOVERNOR ABSENT FROM CITY

Lincoln, May 19.—(Special.)—To the music of a motion picture machine a delegation of workers for the dry amendment marched to the south entrance of the state house and were received by Secretary of State Pool on the steps.

Sixty-seven Thousand Named.

The petitions contain 67,462 names and were received informally at the office of the secretary of state, but will not be legally received until Governor Moorehead is present.

Pool Gives Medal.

As alleviation for their disappointment in not seeing the petitions filed, Secretary Pool presented each visitor with a medal with a picture of himself in bas-relief on one side, and in looking upon the good looking physiognomy of the secretary the visitors forgot all their troubles.

Sheriff Ratekin Gets Continuance

Beatrice, Neb., May 19.—(Special.)—Sheriff Ratekin of Falls City and Walter Ayers, who were arrested Wednesday on the charge of assault and battery preferred by Mrs. Marie Colby, wife of General L. W. Colby of this city, when they forcibly took the little daughter of Henry Seeley of Humboldt from her on the street, secured a continuance in the case yesterday to May 26. They were released on bond of \$200 each.

W. H. MICHAEL, FORMERLY OF GRAND ISLAND, IS DEAD

Grand Island, Neb., May 19.—(Special.)—Word was received in this city today announcing the death of W. H. Michael, a former Grand Island citizen, assistant secretary of state under the administration of President McKinley and later consul at Bombay, India. Mr. Michael went to Washington from this city in the eighties, having previously to that time been prominent in the republican party and interested in the then existing Grand Island Times, established in opposition to the late Fred Hedde, founder of the Independent. While he was in India he was taken ill and has been more or less of an invalid ever since. The funeral will take place today, interment being made in the Arlington cemetery, Washington.

DIXON TAXPAYER OBJECTS TO DOCTOR'S "EXPERT" FEE

Lincoln, Neb., May 19.—(Special.)—An aftermath of the Flege murder case from Dixon county came up in the state supreme court when an appeal from the district court of Dixon county was filed this morning asking for a hearing in the matter of a judgment secured by A. D. Dunn of the Creighton Medical college of Omaha, who, as an expert witness, filed a claim for \$300 for services.

FREMONT COMMITTEE COMMENDS EVANGELIST

Fremont, Neb., May 19.—(Special.)—The executive committee in charge of the Rayburn union gospel meetings at its final session unanimously adopted a resolution thanking the evangelist and members of his party. The statement of the treasurer shows total receipts of \$1,910.89 and expenditures of \$1,274.16. The balance was paid into the treasury of the Ministerial union. The tabernacle was built entirely by voluntary labor and a number of Fremont business houses donated material to the value of about \$200.

Mrs. Whitney Asks Divorce Grand Island, Neb., May 19.—(Special.)—Mrs. Dora E. Whitney today filed a suit for divorce from Delbert Whitney, who she married at Council Bluffs in 1904. She alleges cruelty and asks for alimony. The defendant, she says, is now earning \$80 per month.

HAIL MEN BEFORE BOARD

Insurance Agents Have Merry Time Over the Conduct of Business.

CASE NOW UNDER ADVISEMENT

Lincoln, May 19.—(Special.)—What the State Board of Insurance will do with the protest filed yesterday and heard before them covering charges that twenty-one stock companies of other states handling hail insurance were in a combine to control the hail insurance business of Nebraska will be given out later.

P. F. Zimmer, a Lincoln insurance agent made the charge, but admitted to the board that he could not prove it. However, the authorship of a pamphlet sent out over the state alleging certain things financially against certain companies, was discovered when Charles L. Falmagne of Omaha, manager of the Columbia Fire Insurance company, admitted that he had the pamphlets printed and that 150 copies were sent out to his company's agents. He said there was no malice in the distribution of the pamphlets and they were not intended for public distribution.

Harman to Hastings.

Food Commissioner C. E. Harman has gone to Hastings to attend the state association meeting of the United Commercial Travelers of Nebraska of which he is a member.

Distribute Forest Funds.

The state superintendent has made the assignment to the counties entitled to a part of the forest reserve fund given the state by the government each year. Under the law one-fifth of this goes to the road fund of these counties, one-fifth to the schools entitled to it and three-fifths to the entire school districts of the county.

New Trust Company Formed.

The state auditor today granted a charter to the Surety Mortgage and Trust company of David City, which has a capital of \$25,000. Ten thousand dollars in securities were filed with the auditor as a guaranty. This is the seventeenth organization authorized by the state auditor, though but sixteen are now in business.

Dog That Bit Potts Declared Not "Mad"

Lincoln, Neb., May 19.—(Special.)—The dog that bit A. W. Potts at St. Paul and was shot to death because he was charged with being mad, died with a cloud upon his good name, which an examination of his brain by the authorities at the Omaha medical school have determined he was not entitled to.

In other words the dog was not mad. The state bacteriologist, Dr. Schultz, has reported that "the brain shows the absence of the Van-Gehuchten-Nelis change considered characteristic of rabies."

TAX SALE PURCHASER MUST PERFECT RIGHTS

Lincoln, Neb., May 19.—(Special.)—A tax sale purchaser sleeps on his rights, if he fails to perfect his title under the tax sale certificate within the statutory period, according to an opinion by Deputy Attorney General Barrett, given in answer to an inquiry made by the county attorney of York county.

Lawrence Hang gave the valedictory address, a history of the Shelton public school since the district was organized in 1874, and Prof. R. J. Elliott, president of the Kearney State Normal, gave an address on education. Prof. E. F. Monroe presented the diplomas.

Niobrara, Neb., May 19.—(Special.)—G. C. Porter, state secretary of the socialist party of Omaha, was in Niobrara today on his way to points west. He is touring the state in an auto and delivering socialist speeches throughout the state.

Major McLaughlin of Washington and employed in the Indian office at Washington was in Niobrara on May 17 and gave deeds to more than thirty Ponca Indians. He also gave them United States citizenship badges. The major gave them a good talk of how to be good and useful citizens. There was over a hundred deeds granted to the Santee Indians. Agent Burton of Santee was here with Major McLaughlin.

DAKOTA RETAIL DEALERS TO RESTRICT PARCEL POST

Pierre, S. D., May 19.—(Special Telegram.)—The State Retail Dealers in their meeting today declared against the further extension of the parcel post, for 1 cent letter postage

and for placing postal rates under control of the Interstate Commerce commission to regulate the rates so that each division should be self-sustaining. They want a government owned merchant marine, government grain storage depots to hold grain to equalize prices, for federal inspection of grain, for rural credits, but

opposed to the present bill pending in congress, for a state inspection of weights and measures. They are for preparedness under government control and supervision cut loose from corporate influences. They selected Sioux Falls as their next place of meeting, and these for officers next year.
