Arae (evidently a misprint for Guas), who are none other than the Kan-sas Indians, later on called Quans and Kaws by the French.

Meaning of the Name.

"The meaning of the word Quivera and its derivation now becomes plain and simple, for it is nothing else than the Spanish pronunciation for the name of this Indian nation, the Skidi-ra, or Wolf people. Coronado arrived here on July 11, 1541, the forty-second day from the Red river and the twelfth from the Platte crossing. He remained here until August 6, when the return trip began. It required twelve days to reach the crossing; they arrived there on Au-gust 17, 1541. On this return trip a cross was raised and an inscription. made with a chisel, was placed at the foot of it. I am inclined to believe this inscription was cut on a stone that is located somewhere with in a radius of fifty miles around St. Paul, Neb."
