REPUBLICANS WIN BIGGER NAVY FIGHT

Succeeded in Securing Adoption by House of Fifty Instead of Twenty Subseas.

SIX-BATTLESHIP MOTION LOST

Washington, May 31.—Determined republican efforts to enlarge the building program of the naval appropriation bill as reported by the navy committee resulted in the adoption by the house, sitting as a committee of the whole, of an amendment increasing the number of submarines from twenty to fifty.

Proposals to provide for six battle cruisers instead of five and to add two dreadnaughts and two scout cruisers to the program were defeated after a lively fight.
