Each individual mem-ber of every Woman's Missionary society affiliated with the federation is distinctly a member of the federation and bears the same responsibility to the welfare of the organization as lo the officers. A representative from each of the nine denominations is hosen as a member of the executive oard, which plans the work of the

Aside from the winter school, two ther departments are being planned by the federation. Recognizing the needs of the city a social service de-partment has been organized. Mrs. William Von Weg, jr., of the Kountze Memorial church, is chairman of the welfare committee.

Mrs. F. J. Birss, president of the federation, is now in the east representing the Omaha Woman's club at the biennial convention. She will visit several of the larger cities and investigate the work of the various dissionary federations. Mrs. E. G. McGilton, the fist vice president, is in the meantime filling the place here and arranging an active campaign for unds for carrying on the year's work.
