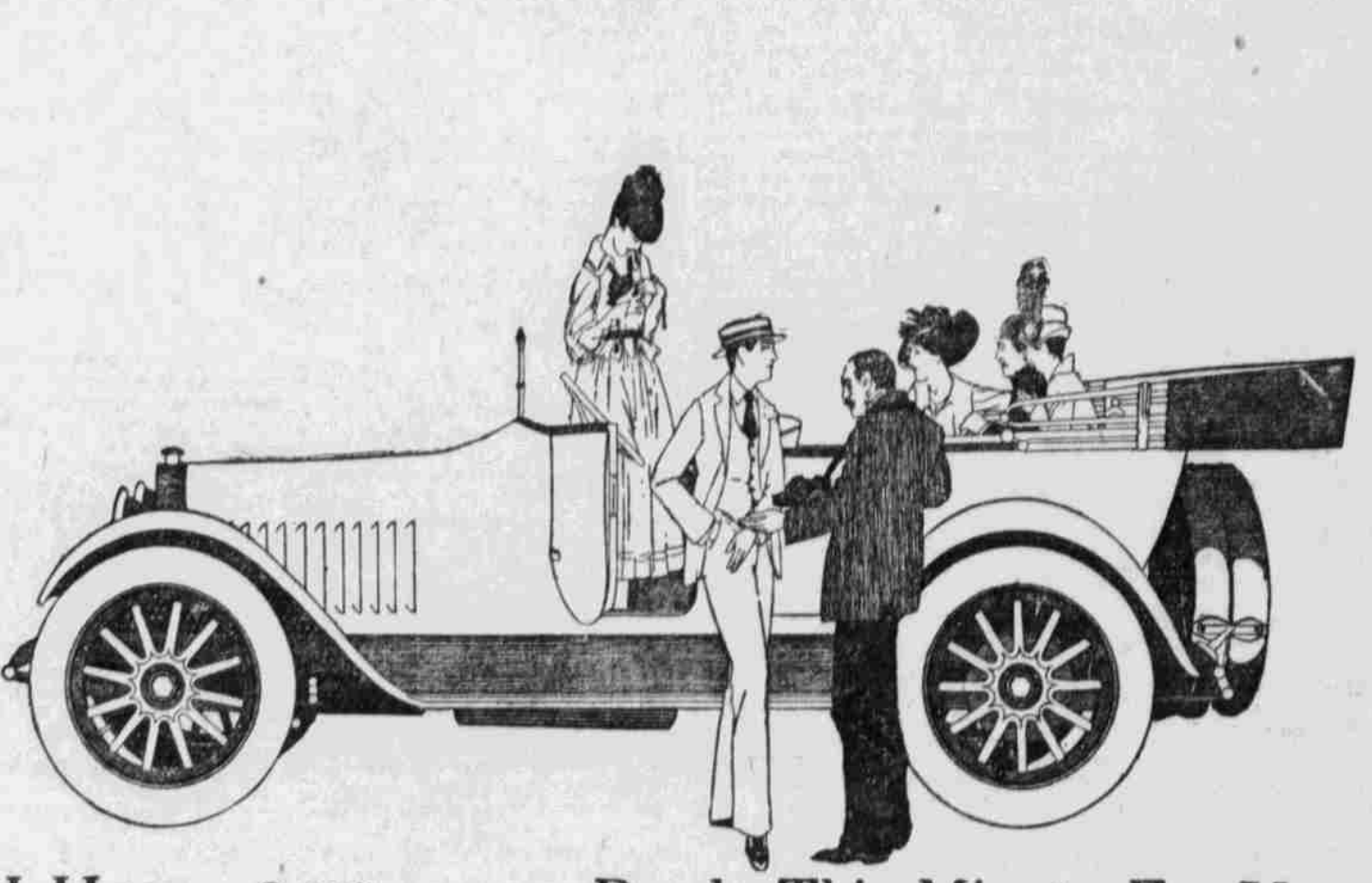

This certainly is a great year for selling cars. Most everybody has had success. Some more than others, as is always the case. I've got cars or can get them now. This may not hold good tomorrow. Next week I shall cut my promises down still more. Remember, there are only two things that I concern myself with these days. One is to get you to take one ride in a 3400 r. p. m. Chalmers if you have not done so already. That's all I want. The car speaks in a language you'll understand. The other thing is simply one of mathematics: if the Chalmers factory can turn out 125 cars a day and Chalmers dealers all over the United States are selling 425 a day, how long will the supply last?
