Berlin, —June 9.—(Wireless to Say-rille.)—The American ambassador, James W. Gerard, has repudiated an interview recently attributed to him on the subject of President Wilson's peace efforts, the Overseas News

peace efforts, the Overseas News agency says.

According to a statement given out by the news agency today a manuscript containing a copy of the spurious interview was submitted to Mr. Gerard with the idea that it was to have been published in the National Zeitung, but the ambassador refused to sanction it. The statement says:

"Ambassador Gerard stated to a staff member of the Vossische Zeitung that he never made the utterances in regard to President Wilson's proposed peace mediation attributed to him and quoted in the Reichstag.
