

VILLISTA GENERALS JOINING CARRANZA

Bandit Chieftains Make Peace With De Facto Government and Gather at Juarez.

NOW EXPECT OTHER RAIDS

El Paso, Tex., June 28.—Fresh cause for apprehension was found along the border late today in news of the gathering of strong forces of former Villistas under notorious chieftains in the vicinity of Juarez and the close surveillance by the civil and military authorities of former adherents, who are now refugees in El Paso.

General Jose Flores, commanding 800 infantrymen, is reported in Juarez after making peace with the de facto government.

General Manuel Banda, once a Villa subordinate, known to be across the Rio Grande, and Manuel Medina-victa and Jose Ysabel Robles, also have taken advantage of the amnesty granted by Carranza. Still another former Villa leader, Colonel Maximo Castillo, has joined General Gonzalez' garrison in Juarez. Castillo, who has been blamed for the dynamiting of the Cumbre tunnel in February, 1914, in which twenty-five Americans and fifty Mexicans lost their lives, recently returned to Mexico, via Vera Cruz from Cuba, where he went after being released from custody after the Cumbre crime.

Hachita Raid Ominous.

The bandit raid near Hachita, which resulted in the murder of William Parker and his bride, still was a fruitful subject of speculation today in connection with the presence of Villistas in Juarez and the apparent lack of protection afforded the border from bandit raids. Their probable activities in the event of hostilities give rise to numerous alarmist theories.

Although the embargo on munitions still is enforced rigidly at points of entry, that regarding food is not. Several wagon loads of foodstuffs, held up at the international bridges, were released today after the consignors received permission from Washington to send them across in response to protests against the detention of the goods. That the food shortage is becoming more acute in the interior of Mexico was declared by arrivals from the south who told of bread lines in Chihuahua City, Durango and Torreon and brought pictures to substantiate their statements.

Dynamite Squads Organized.

Mexican refugees who reached the border today from the mining districts of Chihuahua brought stories of the organization of the "dynamite squads" in General Trevino's army. They said it is planned that should it become apparent in the event of war that the de facto troops could not hold the railroads, to destroy them, and the detachments now stationed along the Mexican Central and the Mexico Northwestern will be concentrated at Chihuahua City. Bombs and hand grenades, it was said, were being made by plugging the ends of small pipes after filling them with powder, nails and scrap iron.

Guardmen Expected Soon.

Arrival of the first National Guardsmen, expected hourly, is being awaited with interest. Arrangements virtually have been completed for their camp sites, provisioning and drilling by regulars.

The largest guard since the present crisis developed was stationed last night at the international bridges, although no fear that should an outbreak occur an attempt would be made to rush the structure.

It was believed that should such a foray occur the attempt would be staged at some other point along the river.

British Troops Are Advancing Over Wide Front in West

British Headquarters in France, Tuesday, June 27.—(Via London, June 28).—British guns continued today the bombardment over a broad front which was begun yesterday. The Associated Press correspondent riding seventy miles behind the lines found the same regular pounding of positions on both days, whether in the Somme region or along the Vimy ridge.

Under cover of the bombardment the British made numerous trench raids last night, bringing in thousands of prisoners.

ITALIANS CONTINUE AUSTRIAN DRIVE

Official Report Tells of the Capture of Two New Positions.

OTHER GAINS RECORDED

Rome, June 28.—(Via London).—The Italians have flung back the Austrians a further distance on the Trentino front. The war office today announced the capture of Monte Giomonda, north of Fusine, and Monte Cavojo. These positions lie between Posina and Astico.

The communication says: "From the Adige to the Brenta commanding positions and strongly organized defenses now reached by the enemy have increased largely its activity in resisting our advances. Nevertheless, we made considerable progress yesterday."

"In the Lagarina valley and in the Arsa valley there was intense artillery action. We shelled positions of the enemy on Monte Trappola and Monte Tests and took the trenches near Malga Sugna."

"Between the Posina and the Astico we took the enemy's positions of Monte Giomonda, north of Fusine, and Monte Cavojo. Cavalry detachments reached Pedescala."

"On the Asiago plateau we occupied the southern side of the Arsa valley and reached the slopes of Monte Rasca, Monte Interrotto and Monte Mosciagh, which were held strongly by the rear enemy's guards. Further north after carrying Monte Colombara we began to approach Galmarra valley."

SUMMARY OF THE WAR

THE NOTABLE ADVANCE of the Italians over the ground from which they were forced in the recent Austrian offensive shows no signs of a halt.

DISPATCHES FROM THE British front in France and Flanders lay emphasis upon the intensity of the bombardment which is being brought to bear upon the German lines.

THE FRENCH ARE HOLDING their own north of Verdun, where continued attack in the Thiaumont and Fleury sectors, delivered last night, were completely checked, according to the Paris bulletin.

THE GERMAN RESISTANCE to the Russian offensive in Volhynia has been further strengthened. Berlin announces a gain of ground on the Stry, where the village of Winiewka was taken by storm from the Russians.

One Year Ago Today in the War

Austro-German armies captured Tomaszow, in southern Poland. Berlin reported five French attacks near Verdun were repulsed. German troops reached Kamionka, twenty-five miles northeast of Lemberg. Germans fiercely assailed Russian army in its new position along the Bug river.

GERMAN ATTACK ON FLEURY REPULSED

French War Office Tells of the Vigorous Fighting at Many Points Near Verdun.

BRITONS TAKE THOUSANDS

Paris, June 28.—German troops last night delivered another attack on the French positions near Fleury, on the sector of the Verdun front, over which violent fighting has been in progress for several days. The assault was checked by the French fire, the war office announced today.

There was spirited fighting near the Thiaumont works, which the Germans captured several days ago, but no change took place in the situation there. West of the Meuse there was no infantry fighting of importance. Artillery engagements occurred in the sector between Avocourt and Chantancourt.

The statement says: "South of Lassigny the Germans endeavored last night to deliver several surprise attacks upon minor French posts. All their efforts failed."

"In the Champagne district a strong reconnoitering party of the enemy which was trying to reach our lines along the road from St. Hilaire Le Grand to St. Souplet was dispersed by our fire."

More Grenade Fighting. "On the left bank of the Meuse there has been artillery fighting in the vicinity of Avocourt and Chantancourt. At Hill No. 304 and at Dead-man's Hill there have been minor engagements with hand grenades."

"On the right bank of the river there was a counter attack at 3 o'clock this morning on our positions north-east of Hill No. 321. This was repulsed with hand grenades. Another counter attack between Fleury and the eastern boundary of the Chapire wood was checked."

"In the vicinity of the Thiaumont works, where the fighting was spirited last night, the situation remains unchanged."

FEDERAL ORDER IS ISSUED AT LINCOLN

Lieutenant Colonel Baehr is Given Command of Men Mustered Into Service.

JAYCOX, ORDNANCE CHIEF

Mobilization Camp, Lincoln, Neb., June 28.—(Special Telegram).—The first federal order was issued this morning. Lieutenant Colonel Baehr of Omaha is made chief of command of the men mustered, Major A. T. Haysel of Lincoln adjutant major, John M. Birker of Lincoln quartermaster, Captain Jaycox of Omaha chief ordnance officer and Major Waldron of Beatrice chief surgeon.

The Fourth regiment of the Nebraska National Guard has been mustered in and the First battalion been given physical examination. Only a few more than a dozen men were rejected from the first four companies examined. The mustering in of the Fifth regiment is proceeding rapidly today. The Central department has been notified that the signal corps is ready to go, having been completely mustered in and physically examined. Recruiting for the Fourth regiment is progressing at a good rate, forty men being added since yesterday morning.

COWBOYS TAKE HOT TRAIL INTO MEXICO

Pursuit of Murderers of Parker Family May Result in Fresh Complications.

SIX SUSPECTS ARRESTED

Columbus, June 29.—It was reported today that while employes of the Diamond "A" ranch, nine miles east of Hachita, were helping hunt the slayers of the Parkers the ranch was raided last night and a number of horses taken.

Cowpunchers of the Diamond "A" and U Bar outfits today sent a courier to Hachita with news that they had located a hot trail and were following it into Mexico. It was feared that fresh complications may arise from the venture, as the punchers probably are well into the interior by this time.

Six Mexicans were arrested in Hachita today on suspicion of being implicated in the Parker killing and are being held pending an investigation. It is believed, however, that they are guiltless.

Northwestern Express Rates Are Declared Discriminatory

Washington, June 28.—Express rates from Sioux City, Ia., to South Dakota points were held discriminatory by the Interstate Commerce commission in favor of Sioux Falls, S. D., and a reduction in interstate rates to conform with those of the South Dakota Railroad commission were ordered.
