U. S. Supreme Court Reverses Itself

An unique court decision, one in which the United States supreme court has flatly reversed itself, is revealed in that tribunal's decision in the case of United States against Fred Nice, the syllabus of which has just been received here. This decision holds that an Indian is not a citizen even though he holds an allotment of land and that, therefore, sale of liquor to such an Indian is a violation of the law.

Since the first decision congress passed the Bourke act, providing that in all allotments of land to Indians, the government held the land in trust and was the guardian of the Indians.
