Mr. F. W. Grosjean and sister left for Gardiner, Mont., Tuesday evening. They intend spending their vacation in Yellowstone.

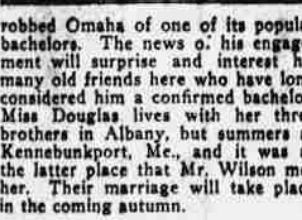
