Omaha, July 10, 1916. The cash wheat market was strong today, falling from unchanged to 2c higher. Wheat receipts were quite heavy and there was a fairly active demand for all grades of this cereal. The sales were also heavy and most of the receipts were sold at a premium, the poorer samples selling at practically unchanged prices.

There was a good demand for corn and the market sold from unchanged to 1c higher, the bulk selling around Saturday's prices. The oats market was rather dull, although the receipts of this cereal were very good, there were only a few sales reported. The market, however, was quoted steady to 1/2c higher.
