

GRAIN AND PRODUCE

All Cash Grains Are Active and Strong, With Wheat Leading at Two-Cent Advance.

CORN FROM HALF TO ONE CENT

Omaha, July 12, 1916. The local cash market was quite active today and there was a substantial advance in the price of all cereals.

There was a good demand for all grades of corn and receipts were very light.

The wide margin between yellow corn and the other varieties has narrowed considerably and yellow corn is selling at only a slight fraction above the white and mixed.

The oats market continued active and raised from 1/2 to 1/4 cent higher.

There were no samples of rye or barley on the tables and these markets were quoted usually unchanged.

Clearances were: Wheat and flour equal to 1,348,000 bushels; corn, 252,000 bushels; rye, 1,337,000 bushels; oats, 1,337,000 bushels.

Primary data receipts were 744,000 bushels and shipments 489,000 bushels, against receipts of 477,000 bushels and shipments of 439,000 bushels last year.

Omaha Future Market. The local future market was very quiet, and trading was very light.

A quiet market in wheat is to be expected until the first of next week.

Trading in September and December wheat was quite active toward the close, but the corn and oat markets remained quiet throughout the session.

The wheat market was strong, on continued reports of black rust and a good export demand.

Scattered rains in the corn belt served to have a bearish effect on corn.

September, when it is expected to be a little higher, and December and October corn were 1/2 cent lower and September oats about 1/4 cent higher.

Concerted Selling of Special Issues Conspicuous Feature of the Market.

ALCOHOL SHARES CENTER

New York, July 12.—Concerted selling of special stocks, particularly those issues which suffered most severely in last week's liquidating movement, was the conspicuous feature of today's professional market.

The short interest, emboldened by its recent success, continued its operations with great confidence, but made little headway except in isolated instances.

United States Industrial Alcohol proved to be the most active issue, notably the better known rail and United States steel, again without success, albeit steel was forced down to 17 1/2.

Mike Marjovich, 2811 R street, Austrian, laborer at one of the local packing houses lies dangerously wounded in the South Side hospital and Tom Smith, Sioux City, is in jail as the result of a cutting scrape at "Bloody Corner" Twenty-eighth and R streets last evening at 9 o'clock.

The cutting was accidental as the knife in the hands of Smith, it is said, was meant for Mike Marjovich, 2809 R street, with whom he was arguing.

Sergeant James Sheehan and Health Officer Henry Schmeling arrested Smith. A furious mob was about to set on Smith when Schmeling interfered and stood by the arrested man until it was possible to remove him to the station.

Marjovich was cut several times in the right side. Police Surgeon R. R. Losley attended him. One of the wounds penetrated the liver. The man was not expected to live last evening.
