BOOB HEIR MAKES FIGHT FOR ESTATE
Lands and Money of Late Paul Boob, Sarpy County Farmer, at Stake.

IN COURT AT PAVILLION
An estate containing 3,331 acres of Sarpy county farming land and several thousand dollars, besides totalling an acre something more than \$125,000, are at stake in a trial in which Julianne Boob Pope, heir of the late Paul Boob, well known Sarpy county farmer, is endeavoring to have her former guardian, James R. Wilson, reinstated and to receive the property said to have been wrongfully taken from her.
