Miss Louise Pound of the Lincoln Country club is the first woman golf champion of Nebraska. She won the title by defeating Mrs. John T. Stewart, 2d, of the Omaha Country club, 4 up and 3 to play, in the final round at the Omaha Field club, and in defeating Mrs. Stewart set a new women's record for the course. Both women played good golf, but Miss Pound was by far the steeper. Her game was almost mechanical, and her putting better than that seen in many masculine championship matches. Her score of 88 for the eighteen holes is two strokes better than the former women's record for the Field club course, a 90, made by Miss Pound in her qualifying round. Iowa farmers lost 476,712 hogs through hog cholera in 1915, according to a report issued yesterday by the Board of Agriculture. The loss figures are \$4,767,120. The loss from cholera in 1915 was about one-fifth the loss in 1913 reported 2,709,876 hogs died of cholera. The loss figured \$27,098,760. The department reports 9,361,882 hogs on Iowa farms July 1, 1915, as against 9,397,273 in 1913. The department did not collect statistics for 1914, as these were included in the census.

There are now 1,219 state and savings banks in Iowa under the supervision of the State Banking department. There were 115 new banks organized in the last two years.
