EXCELLENT CASH DEMAND

Omaha, August 10, 1916. Cash wheat scored another sharp advance and ruled from 3c to 5c over yesterday's prices.

The corn market was a little easier and ruled from 1/4c higher to 1/4c lower, the bulk of the sample going at lower prices.

The oats market was quiet generally, with a few lower bids for the higher grades declining in price and the No. 4 white advancing a quarter.

There were no sales of rye and barley reported and these markets were quoted nominally unchanged.

Livestock closed: Wheat strong, 80 3/4; corn, 1 3/4; soybean higher.

Primary wheat receipts were 2,311,000 bushels and shipments 1,353,000 bushels.

Primary corn receipts were 450,000 bushels and shipments 480,000 bushels.

Primary soybean receipts were 1,623,000 bushels and shipments 154,000 bushels.
