CHOOSING THE SCHOOL

UNIVERSITY ADDS COURSE IN MUSIC

Students Cannot Take It Though Except in Connection With Collegiate Work.

PLAN IN EFFECT THIS TERM

At the last meeting of the board of regents a committee consisting of Chancellor Avery and Regents Haller and Miller was authorized to complete arrangements for musical instruction in the University of Nebraska.

When the School of Fine Arts was reorganized some years ago, music, as well as painting and dramatics was included in the charter of organization. Special courses in the latter subjects, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Fine Arts were organized at once. The faculties also passed a similar course in music, but the regents delayed its adoption because the ways and means of providing musical instruction proved to be difficult.

Theory and History.

After very careful consideration it has been decided to establish a department of the theory and history of music, the courses of which shall be open to all students of the College of Arts and Sciences. Instruction in applied music (piano, organ, violin and voice) is to be provided by accrediting private teachers, an adequate number of whom are available in Lincoln to assure the success of the plan. All teachers so accredited will be nominated to the board of regents by the committee on music of the School of Fine Arts. Standards similar to those that apply in regular university appointments will govern the selection.

Instruction in applied music will be given from two points of view. Any student in the College of Arts and Sciences may receive credit for eight credit hours of applied music, the maximum for any one semester being two hours.

Students who wish to specialize in music at the university will enroll in the special musical course in the School of Fine Arts. In this course approximately one-half of the student's time will be devoted to music and one-half to collegiate subjects.

No student who is registered for less than twelve hours of work can receive credit for music and his credit for music will be based on the number of hours he has completed in a minimum of two hours for any one semester.

The university will not offer a purely musical course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Music. This sphere of activity is reserved for universities. For the university plans a coordination of musical and collegiate instruction.

Instruction in the theory and history of music will be in charge of Rabbi Jacob Singer, who has been appointed with the rank of assistant professor. For the year 1916-1917 these two courses will be offered in this department.

Elementary Harmony—This course deals with the fundamental principles of melody, harmony and rhythm. Through exercises in ear training and dictations, the ability to think musically will be developed. The study of harmony will be carried through triads and their inversions, seventh and ninth chords, non-harmonic tones, and simple modulations, and will include the harmonization of both given bass and given

MANY SUBJECTS AT STATE UNIVERSITY

Students Can Take Any Studies Under Best Faculty and Conditions.

TERM OPENS SEPTEMBER 13

The University of Nebraska, at Lincoln, opens for the first semester on Wednesday September 13. Other dates of entry are given as the second semester about February and the summer session usually the first full week in June.

The University of Nebraska includes the following colleges and schools:

The graduate college, a four-year course leading to master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees; the College of Arts and Sciences, a four-year course leading to the degree of bachelor of arts; the Teachers' college, a four-year course leading to the teachers' college diploma; the College of Agriculture, four years to bachelor of science degree; College of Law, three years to bachelor of laws degree; College of Medicine, four years in Omaha leading to doctor of medicine degree; College of Pharmacy, two years to bachelor of science in pharmacy; graduate School of Education, the School of Commerce, the School of Fine Arts, all leading to the degrees of their respective class. In addition there is the Teachers' college high school, the School of Agriculture, the summer session and university extension work.

The Nebraska experiment station, the Nebraska School of Agriculture at Curtis and the experimental sub-stations at North Platte, Valentine and Scottsbluff are also in charge of the board of regents.

Shattuck School. Shattuck school at Fairbault, Minn., was established in 1888 and now boasts sixteen buildings on 200 acres of ground. Under many a host of its kind, Shattuck school is not far behind. Every credit paid goes to the education of the boy.

Shattuck school prepares boys for college. Recent graduates are in Yale, Harvard, Princeton, West Point and twenty-seven other colleges. In addition to the preparatory for college work there are thorough courses for business life, physical training for every boy—four courses, gymnastics, swimming, football, outdoor and indoor track and it has a wide reputation for clean sport. In addition there is military drill under a regular army officer and it is rated as an honor school by the War department.

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COLLEGE OF ST. THOMAS

A Large Military Academy Under the Direction of Archbishop Ireland.

The College of St. Thomas, a Catholic military academy, under the direction of Archbishop Ireland at St. Louis, Mo., announces its fall term opening early in September. This term is ranked as an honor school in the United States War department. The courses offered are with state, national, moral and religious training. Last year the college had 700 students from twenty-four states. It is noted that the management profits will be fewer this year.

Palmer College.
C. A. Watkins, president of Palmer College and Albia University at Albia, Mo., announces the fall opening of that school for early September. Palmer college is an educational institution offering French courses with collegiate and full preparatory work. The school has a new arrangement with girl hall. The atmosphere of the school is strictly Christian and there are excellent opportunities for students of limited means.

Bellevue College.
A Long Established School With a Record of Great Accomplishment.

"Bellevue college, Bellevue, Neb., is announcing the opening of the fall term and the opening is approved by the fact that 21 per cent of the 1,128 names in the 1915 'Black White' list are graduates of that school. The list is noted that eighteen of the twenty-seven presidents of the United States have been graduates of Bellevue college, and fifteen have been graduates.

Bellevue college offers studies in such courses as law, medicine, natural science, business, music, art and education. Each department is provided with a complete apparatus and equipped with the best of their work. Bellevue credits are accepted elsewhere so that students making preparation for college can enter the best colleges and universities in the land.

Forest Park.
Forest Park college, of St. Louis, Mo., opens its fifty sixth year in early September with a new four year course in business, law, medicine, pharmacy, dentistry and all state universities.

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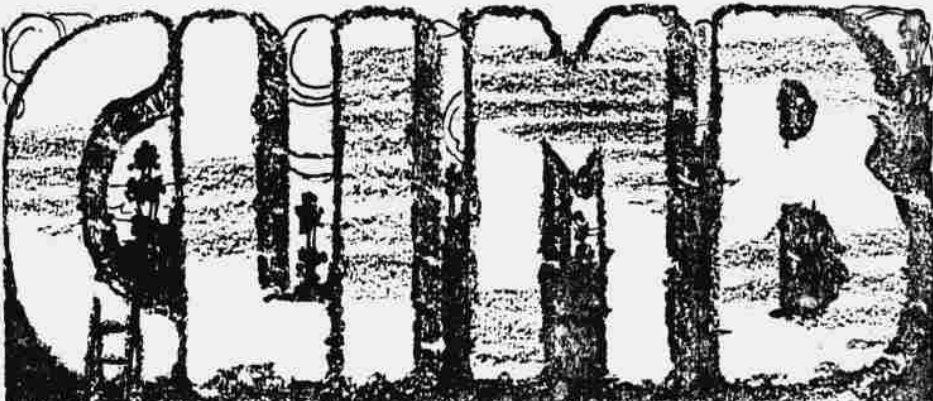
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
